The Escape of Judah P. Benjamin NEW YORK, August 3.—The World's Havana correspondent gives an account of Juda's P. Benjamin's escape com the ruins of the Confederacy. He carly in May, near Washington, Ga., for the purpose of making his way to Nassan and Havana from some point on the Florida coast. He was to attend to some public business at the posts, and then rejoin the President in transmission and the posts, and then rejoin the President in transmission via Matamoras and Texas. He traveled directly South through Georgia and Florida, on horseback, disguised as a farmer in search of land, without exciting or attracting attention, till he reached the lower side of the penin ula of Florida. He was informed no boats could be found on the eastern coast, and went to the gulf shore, where, after a mouth's delay, he succeeded in getting a ship yard boat and two men who were willing to risk their lives upon the sea in it. The open boat was about fifteen feet long, in which they coasted the peninsula till they reached one of the keys of Florida reef, where they suc-ceeded in procuring a boat somewhat larger, in which they put to sea to cross the gulf stream, and fortunately reached Bordes upon the banks after a passage of sixty hours.

On the 10th day of July, after an unsuccessful attempt to reach Nassau, in which he was baffled by head winds and heavy weather, he put back to Barnes, and on Friday, the 14th, the sloop foundered thirty miles from the shoop foundered thirty miles from the nearest land. The vessel went down so rapidly that he with the crew, had barely time to jump into a skiff in tow of the shoop before she sank. In this boat, with a light mast, sail and compass, and only provisions of boiled rice which the negroes had cooked for breakfast, in this leaky and over-loaded boat, and having but one oar, they made for land, and, as the weather was calm and no vessel in sight, by dint of energetic sculling they easily reached the lighthouse. In a vessel from that point Benjamin reached Nassau and Havana. His whole trip has occupied the best part of three menths out of which thirty days have been passed at sea, in miserable open

as aforcasid, no person shall be qualified as an elector, or shall be eligible as a member of such Convention, unless he shall have previously taken and subscribed the oath of an elector, or shall be eligible as a member of such Convention, unless he shall have previously taken and subscribed the oath of amnesty, as set forth in the President's proclamation of May 29, A. D. 1865, and is a voter qualified as prescribed by the Constitution and laws of the State of South Carolina in force immediately before the seventcenth (17th) day of November, A. D. 1860, the date of the so-called Ordinance of Secession; and the said Convention, when convened, or the Legislature that may be thereafter assembled, will prescribe the qualification of electors, and the eligibility of persons to hold office under the Constitution and laws of the State, a power the people of the several States composing the Federal Union have rightfully exercised from the origin of the Government to the present time.
