Stormy Cabinet Session.

WASHINGTON, August 11.—A long Cabinet was held to-day, and report says a rather stormy one. The President's reconstruction policy is understood to have been discussed in all its length and breadth, and his determination to adhere to it and to carry it out, regardless of opposition or consequences, emphatically announced.

APPROACH OF THE CHOLERA.—A Washington despatch of the 12th says: "The news from Europe which was received at the State Department yesterday seems to dispel all doubt about the steady westward progress of the cholera. It had reached the Island of Malta in the Mediterranean Sea, South of Italy, where it was raging with great violence and with terribly fatal effect. It was also prevailing in the form of the most malignant epidemic at Constantinople, and it was hourly expected at Odessa, on the Northern shores of the Black Sea, near the Crimea. There can be no doubt now that this terrible scourge will soon reach the Western countries of Europe, and it is more than probable that it will cross the Atlantic. If the sanitary condition of our sea-board cities was what it ought to be, there might not be ground for much alarm on the subject. Baltimore is prepared for the terrible visitor. But for Washington, the Intelligencer a day or two ago said: "We shudder to contemplate the scenes that must be witnessed in Washington if the cholera should make its appearance here in the present condition of the city." The city authorities are moving in the matter, but they will have to move with rapidity and decision, for there is an Herculean task before them.

A BOY FLOGGED TO DEATH.—A resident of Harlem informs the Tribune that a boy of fourteen years, the only son of his widowed mother, committed a petty offence, for which his employer caused him to be sent to the House of Refuge, where a flogging was administered that caused the lad's death. The informant adds: "Stretched on a box, he was flogged on his arrival, and the castigation was repeated when he did not or could not perform the task allotted to him. Death came with so little warning, or the summons of the mother to the dying bed of her boy was so long delayed, that she arrived only to see the last gasp of him who, a few days before, had entered that institution a hale and handsome boy. There was not a dry eye, says a spectator, at the agony of that mother when she denounced the men who had scourged her boy to death."

THE TEXAS FRONTIER.—The Gonzales Inquirer says: "The frontier counties have been reduced to poverty, in the way of cattle. Thousands have been driven off to Kansas. One man alone lost 14,000 out of 25,000 head." "We have no doubt of the correctness of these statements, and had the Inquirer added that tens of thousands had been stolen and driven off to Mexico, the picture would have been more complete."—Cable Gazette.

OBITUARY.

JAMES T. LATTI, born July 19, 1827, departed this life at Pendleton, S. C., aged nearly thirty-eight years. He was graduated at Yale College in the year 1847. Born of Scotch-Irish Presbyterian parentage, he received the seal of the covenant in his early infancy, and was trained up in the fear of the Lord. In the year — he professed his faith in the Redeemer of sinners, at Pendleton, joined the church at that place, under the pastoral care of Rev. Dr. McBryde, and not long before his own decease, was made a Ruling Elder in the same. He was a growing Christian from the time of his first conversion. The effects of grace upon his whole character and life were very marked. It softened and sweetened his temper; it made him humble as a little child; it opened him from the world with all its attractions and charms; it made him patient under sufferings protracted through years of declining health; it made him liberal to the poor and to every good and worthy object; it caused him to grow rapidly and constantly in the grace of giving. Few rich men have ever learned better than James T. Latti the luxury of doing good, and how the greatest gratification which wealth can afford is in many cases that which it purchases when given away. He was a man of energy, industry and public spirit, such as neither Church nor State can afford to lose at a time like the present. His death was very characteristic—it was calm and full of peace and of hope as became the close of such a life. Just forty-five minutes before one o'clock, on the morning of the 23d May, 1865, immortal daylight dawned upon his spirit. His wearied frame rests sweetly in the lowly bed our Saviour has blessed for all his people. Nor wife, nor sons, nor sister, nor mother, would recall him to the sorrowful scene of this mortal life. Mark the perfect end and behold the upright, (that is the blessed and completed subject of Divine grace) for the end of that man is peace. J. E. A.
