

RAILROADS.—One of our most pressing wants at this moment is the re-establishment of our Railroad communications. Just now it is easier to go from Augusta North via Atlanta, Chattanooga, Nashville, and Louisville, or from Winnsboro, in our State, via Charlotte, Greensboro, Danville and Richmond, to the same point, than it is for a person to reach our city from those places. While this position is most unfortunate for us, and for the moment was unavoidable, it should not be allowed to continue a day longer than can possibly be avoided. Whatever energy and the means at our command can effect, should be promptly and untiringly applied to the speedy completion of the railroads without too closely counting the cost. The South Carolina Railroad is our main artery; upon it this city is largely dependent for its prosperity, and its quick restoration to a good working condition cannot be too urgently pressed. Each passenger and every package of freight that passes around or from us in consequence of the want of railroad facilities is a loss to the community. The South Carolina Road, we are aware, have great difficulties to contend with; their track from Johnson's Turn-out, near Aiken, on the Augusta branch, to the Edisto bridge, was broken for some fifty miles, and about the same distance on the Columbia branch, or from near Orangeburg to Columbia, and this part includes the important bridge across the Congaree River, which was burnt. The iron on the Camden branch, we are informed, is being taken up to be placed on the route to Columbia, and it is said the trains may run through to Columbia in October. President Magrath is no doubt at work and doing all he can to place matters right, and we sincerely hope that he may speedily succeed in having the entire road in working order. The difficulties in the way of labor and every other requisite are no doubt great, but the pressing needs of the public require that every sacrifice should be made to have the roads finished. *Charleston News.*

INTERNAL REVENUE RECEIPTS. From the 1st of July up to noon of the 9th, the receipts of the Bureau of Internal Revenue amounted to thirty-two millions of dollars. The increase has been heavy for several days past from the income tax, and will be so for some weeks to come. New questions are constantly arising for decision, in which parties claim theirs to be peculiar cases not contemplated by the framers of the law, and not to be governed by any fixed rules. Many of these rest on slender foundations, but an occasional one really presents new features. Since taxation has become enormous, an immense amount of ingenuity is constantly displayed in attempts to evade our laws regulating customs, even those dating as far back as 1798.

GENERAL ORDERS No. 123.
To secure equal justice and the same personal liberty to the freedmen as to other citizens and inhabitants, all orders issued by Post, District, or other Commanders, adopting any system of passes for them, or subjecting them to any restraints or punishments not imposed on other classes, are declared void.
Neither whites nor blacks will be restrained from seeking employment elsewhere when they cannot obtain it at a just compensation at their homes, and when not bound by voluntary agreement; nor will they be hindered from traveling from place to place on proper and legitimate business.
