#### Trial of Mr. Davis.

WASHINGTON, August 29.—The determination of the President of the United States that Jefferson Davis should be tried by a civil court is likely to be carried out at Norfolk, Virginia. So indicates a despatch received from Washington last night. In that case Chief Justice Chase would preside, Virginia being embraced in his judicial circuit. The direction of military operations from Richmond would be the basis of the charge of treason.

#### Terrible Railroad Disaster.

NASHVILLE, August 28.—The following are the latest details of the frightful railroad disaster which occurred on the Tennessee and Alabama Railroad, yesterday morning. As the morning train was passing over the trestle at Richland Neck, seventy miles South of Nashville, the trestle suddenly gave way and precipitated the train into the creek. Up to 6 o'clock, twelve dead bodies and eighty wounded had been recovered from the wreck. A car containing thirty negroes is still under water. Quite a number of passengers were missing.

#### Proclamation by the President.

WASHINGTON, August 29.—The following proclamation was issued this afternoon:

By the President of the United States of America:

Whereas, by my proclamations of the 13th and 24th of June, 1865, removing restrictions, in part, upon internal, domestic and coastwise intercourse and trade with those States recently declared in insurrection, certain articles were exempted from the effect of said proclamations as contraband of war, and

Whereas, the necessity for restricting trade in said articles has now in a great measure ceased, it is hereby ordered that on and after the 31 day of September, 1865, all restrictions aforesaid be removed, so that articles declared by the said proclamations to be contraband of war may be imported into and sold in said States, subject only to such regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington, this 29th day of August, in the year of our Lord 1865, and the independence of the United States of America, the eighty-ninth.

#### The Shenandoah.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—The latest accounts from the Shenandoah are to the afternoon of the 25th of June, when she was near Cape Thaddeus, steering North-west toward where a fleet of sixty whalers were known to be previously. Capt. Nye had left the bark Milo during a fog in a small boat, for the purpose of warning the fleet of the danger. The Milo also spoke a French whaler, which immediately put away toward the fleet, having considerable start of the Shenandoah.

While the Shenandoah was at Ascension Island, in April, she burned the New London bark Pearl, the New Bedford ship Young Hector, beside a San Francisco and a Hawaiian whaler. She next burned the New Bedford bark Abigail, in Ochotsk Sea, then the Thompson, in Kamtschatka Sea, and then several New Bedford whalers, as reported yesterday, in Adair Sea, where she arrived on the 20th June.

It was feared that unless the French ship's open whale boat could succeed in warning the fleet, all would be captured, as the Shenandoah knew exactly where to find them. They were hovering along the Southern edge of the ice-fields, drawing closer together as the ice drifted toward Behring's Straits, through which they were seeking a passage to the Arctic Zone, as the ice permits.

#### Affairs in the South-west.

CAIRO, August 26.—A few cases of yellow fever are reported at New Orleans, but they excite no uneasiness, as they are of a mild type, and yield readily to careful treatment. The health of the city generally was never better.

NEW ORLEANS, August 29.—Texas advices report the frontier to be in a worse condition than ever before. Austin and San Antonio papers are filled with accounts of outrages by the Indians and highway robberies. Steps have been taken by the military authorities to afford protection to frontier settlers.

Gen. Maxey is out in a letter, which does not give Kirby Smith much credit for truth and veracity.

The condition of the blacks, with a

few exceptions, is represented as satisfactory.

The worm continues its ravages on the cotton crop in the lower counties.

NEW ORLEANS, August 30.—A severe wind storm in Jackson, Miss., to-day, blew down several buildings in course of construction, and some people were injured and one negro was killed.

#### Indian Affairs.

FORT LARAMIE, August 25.—Advices from Gen. Connor's Powder River Expedition to August 21 have been received.

On the 16th instant, a detachment of Connor's Pawnee scouts discovered, pursued and killed all of a war party of Cheyennes, numbering twenty-four, who were returning from the mail road with scalps and plunder. There was no loss on our side. Our men captured twenty-nine horses and mules and a quantity of white women and children's clothing, two infantry coats issued at Fort Laramie last spring to the Indians, who subsequently killed Capt. Fouts and four men of the Seventh Iowa cavalry, and also a number of letters and papers addressed to the men of the Seventh Michigan, now on duty on the mail road, which shows they were direct from the mail line. One of the principal chiefs of the Cheyennes was killed.

The Indians are all moving North with great rapidity for their villages. Gen. Connor left Powder River on the 22d instant, moving North, and concentrating his columns, ready and eager to meet them.
