### Election Returns.

**WINNSBORO, September 6.**—The following is the result of the election held in this District, for members of the Convention: James H. Rion, W. R. Robertson, John H. Bratton.

**CHESTER, September 6.**—C. Davis Melton, James Hemphill, and Dr. A. P. Wylie have been elected members of the Convention from this District.

### Downfall of Juarez's Party in Mexico.

**NEW YORK, August 30.**—It is stated that the Imperialists have forced the army of the Republicans from the Rio Grande, and are now occupying the whole country, with the exception of a small portion of Chihuahua, in which Juarez and his Government were at last accounts attempting to make a last stand. My informant, who is a Mexican gentleman of high character, has no doubt that the intelligence is correct.

### Disturbance on Roanoke Island.

**FORTRESS MONROE, Sept. 2.**—The steamer Washington Irving has arrived at Norfolk, from Roanoke Island. The captain reports that on the eve of their departure from Roanoke Island his engineer went ashore for the mails, and when returning to the boat was attacked by two negroes, pushed and kicked from the sidewalk; whereupon he defended himself by knocking one of the negroes down, for which he was arrested and kept in the lock-up over night. On the morning of the 24th he was brought before Col. Holmes, First United States colored regiment, tried and acquitted. The officers of the Washington Irving say the darkies do as they please on the island, and that it is not safe for a white man to land there.

### New Jersey Democratic Convention.

**TRENTON, Sept. 3.**—In the Democratic Convention, Gen. Runyon was unanimously nominated on the third ballot.

Resolutions were adopted charging the consequences of the war on the election of a sectional President and the fanaticism of the sectional party. Favoring the return of the Government to its original purpose and objects. Favoring the return of gold and silver currency. Declaring and insisting on the rights of the States opposing negro suffrage, and emphatically agreeing with President Johnson that this subject must be left with the States. Opposing the exemption of Government bonds from taxation as unequal.

Expressing sympathy and gratitude to the soldiers, and insisting that the Government shall pay the soldiers the full bounty promised to them. Opposing military arrests. Favoring freedom of elections and the restoration of the writ of *habeas corpus*, and coming down upon the national debt as erroneously and improperly managed.

### Riotous Conduct.

**CHARLESTOWN, Va., August 29.**—An incident occurred a few miles West of this place, this morning, which, for a while, created a good deal of excitement. A negro woman went out to a field, near the residence of a neighboring gentleman, and was set upon by three negro men, who severely cut and bruised her, at the same time declaring their intention to kill every person on the place. They went off, leaving the woman for dead, but she subsequently recovered herself sufficiently to get to the house and give the alarm. Word was immediately sent to town, and a party at once organized and went in pursuit of the guilty parties. They returned about sun-down, however, without accomplishing their mission, the negroes having taken the alarm and fled. The woman, though stabbed in three places, is thought to be not seriously injured.

It is reported here to-day that a difficulty occurred in a barber's shop, in Winchester, yesterday, originating in a question of priority as to "whose turn next," between some negroes and a white man, in which five negroes are said to have been killed. I do not vouch for the truth of this report, but merely "tell the tale as 'twas told to me."—*Cor. Richmond Times.*

**RESTORATION OF THE SOUTHERN STATES.**—It is stated that a call for a grand mass meeting in New York is being extensively signed in that city by leading men of all parties, to adopt resolutions in favor of President Johnson's policy of Southern restoration, and to counteract the adverse agitation of the radicals.

**PRISONERS CAPTURED.**—Statistics of the War Department show that during the war the Federal armies captured over 300,000 prisoners of war, besides paroling about 160,000 more before the final surrender. These records are now undergoing complete compilation, and the facts developed thereby are of much interest.

Another extensive forgery has been brought to light in New York. Geo. Gladwine, whilst at the St. Nicholas Hotel, forged the names of two parties, by which he obtained some \$3,000 in money and \$200,000 in railroad bonds, and then decamped. He was pursued and arrested in New Haven, Connecticut, and the bonds recovered.

A writer in the *Macon Telegraph* recommends that the people of Georgia petition the President to grant a pardon to the Hon. A. H. Stephens. The writer thinks Mr. Stephens would use all his influence for the good of the country, and would assist much in settling matters.

William D. Smyth, of Atlanta, Ga., was shot and wounded, mortally it is thought, at that place on the 19th ultimo, by two men in Federal uniform, who called him to his door.

About thirty paroled Confederates have arrived at St. Louis, and reported that they had been forcibly prevented from staying at their homes in Jackson County, Mo.

A man whose wife bore the virtuous name of Patience, who was not remarkable for her height, was overheard to complain that his Patience was very short.

A New York correspondent writes to the *London Times* that John Mitchell will be turned over to the English Government as an escaped convict from Australia.

A large fire occurred in St. Louis on the 30th ult., which destroyed two warehouses containing 10,000 bales of hemp. One concern lost \$350,000.

Queen Victoria took a pleasure trip by rail recently, and ice was strewn on the top of the car to prevent her temper being affected by the heat.

Domestic goods of all kinds have advanced very much in New York.
