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The President's Views. He Trusts the South—Does not Believe in Sensation Letter-Writers and Editors.

On Monday, the 11th, a delegation of Southern gentlemen, numbering about fifty persons, representing seven States—Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Florida, Arkansas, Virginia and Tennessee—called on President Johnson.

The delegation was introduced to the President at about ten o'clock, and, after the usual courtesies, Hon. W. H. Macfarland, of Virginia, addressed the President in substance as follows:

It became his agreeable and pleasant duty to say that they called upon him to assure him of their personal regard, and their confidence in his purpose to administer the Government upon the highest principles of wisdom and mature statesmanship.

In behalf of the South, he thanked the President for the kindness and leniency that had been shown them, and expressed the thought that whatever may be said to the contrary, the purpose and object of the entire South, he felt assured, was for restoration and peace upon the basis of the Union of the States.

After Mr. Macfarland had concluded his remarks, President Johnson replied as follows:

GENTLEMEN: I can only say, in reply to the remarks of your chairman, that I am highly gratified to receive the assurances he has given me. They are more than I could have expected, under the circumstances.

I stand here to-day, as I have ever stood, firmly in the opinion that if a monopoly contends against this country, the monopoly must go down, and the country must go up.

I am equally opposed to consolidation or concentration of power here, under whatever guise or name; and if the issue is forced upon us, I shall still endeavor to pursue the same efforts to dissuade from this doctrine of running to extremes.

should prevent us from transmitting to our children a country as bequeathed to us by our fathers—I had nothing else to do but stand by the Government, be the consequences what they might.

I find on all sides this spirit of candor and honor prevailing. It is said by all—the issue was ours, and the judgment has been given against us, and the decision having been made against us, we feel bound in honor to abide by the arbitrament.

I stand where I did of old, battling for the Constitution and the union of these United States. In doing so, I know I opposed some of you gentlemen of the South when this doctrine of secession was being urged upon the country, and the declaration of your right to break up the Government and disintegrate the Union was made.
