Be it Ordained, That hereafter any person, or persons, about to build any house, or houses, on any site, new or old, fronting or bounding on any of the streets of the city of Columbia, shall be required to have the same located and the boundaries thereof fixed by the City Surveyor, who shall be entitled to receive for each and every lot so located by him, the sum of five dollars, to be paid by the person or persons owning or leasing the lot or lots to be built upon, and an additional fee for plats—if required—as may be agreed upon by the parties engaging; and in case any person or persons shall erect any house or houses as aforesaid, without having the same located by the City surveyor as aforesaid, such person or person's shall be subject to the penalty exacted by the ordinance of 1851.
