Later from Europe.

FARTHER POINT, November 13, 1865.—The steamship Belgium, with Liverpool dates to the 3d instant, has arrived.

There is still no official news concerning the ministerial arrangements. Clarendon will certainly be Minister of Foreign Affairs. The Globe claims forbearance for the reconstructed ministry until it is enabled to lay before Parliament a programme, upon the satisfactory character of which its existence will depend.

The British Government has ordered all restrictions on American vessels of war to be removed.

LATEST, VIA LIVERPOOL.—The Paris correspondent of the Times says it is generally reported in Paris that the French army in Mexico will be withdrawn by instalments, and by August or September of next year, the whole army will have returned to France. This resolution is said to be adopted, not only from a desire to afford no reasonable ground of complaint, on the part of the United States, but also on economical grounds.

### CIRCULAR NO. 5

In compliance with General Orders No. 60, Current Series, from Headquarters, Department of South Carolina, (herewith re-published.) Sub-District Commanders will, at once, organize a detachment of men, under the direction of a Commissioned Officer, and under the immediate orders of their Assistant Provost Marshal, for the purpose of making complete lists, by personal investigation and inquiry, of all mules, horses, wagons and other vehicles as therein specified, in their respective commands. These lists will include, not only property already reported and registered, but also that which may be in the possession of citizens and unaccounted for.

Upon the completion of these lists, they will be forwarded, through the Assistant Provost Marshal of the District, to these Headquarters.

Captain L. E. MESNARD, 25th Ohio Vet. Vols., Assistant Provost Marshal, is charged with the proper carrying out of this order, and will give such additional instructions to the officers in command of the several details, as in his judgment, the necessities of the case require.

### GENERAL ORDERS NO. 20.

Mules, horses, wagons and other vehicles, that have been left with, or loaned to, the people of South Carolina, for their temporary use, under the permission granted in Gen. W. T. Sherman's order of April 30th, 1865, will not be taken possession of by the agents of the Treasury Department, without authority from these Headquarters, or from higher military authority. Complete lists of all such property, whether belonging to the United States by reason of purchase, capture or impressment, or to the late Confederate States, with the names and residence of the persons having it in possession, will be made out by District Commanders for their respective Districts, as soon as practicable, and forwarded to the Chief Quartermaster of the Department. All animals branded "U. S." will be regarded as belonging to the United States, and will be taken account of. Animals branded "U. S." with "L. C. or S." beneath, will be regarded as having been regularly and properly disposed of by the United States, and will not be taken account of except upon evidence of fraud. In the absence of known marks or brands of the late Confederate States, evidence that animals do not rightfully belong to the parties having them in possession, must be good, to justify their being taken possession of by the United States. All cases of doubt will be taken account of and the evidence reported.

The loan of this property was not, as some persons erroneously suppose, a part of the convention between Generals Sherman and Johnston, and it is liable at any time to be called in for the use and benefit of the United States.

The immediate attention of District Commanders will be directed to the execution of this order.
