Washington, November 28.—Those who have thought that Mr. Golfax spoke in consistence with the views of the President will be satisfied from the telegram hence to the New York Trues, to the effect that upon an interview between these personages of Saturday has, they differed, though it is not likely in an ill-tempered way.

A few additional members of Congress arrived here to-day, including Senator Trumbull, of Illinois. No delay from factious movement in the organization of the House is anticipated. Instead of extraordinary exciting and turbulent times which have been predicted, the present indications are in the opposite direction.
