The College of Charleston.

We are gratified to learn that this venerable institution is to be re-opened on the 1st of January ensuing, under an able corps of professors. In consequence of the interruptions of regular instruction for several years, the wants of the young men of the South are nowling and general sen-South are peculiar, and general sentiment calls for modifications of our systems of education to meet those wants. The expediency of a re-or-ganization of the College was there-fore referred by the trustees to a committee, consisting of the Hons. H. D. Lesesne, W. D. Porter and Geo. Buist, who reported on the 16th ultimo, recommending an enlargement of the basis of educational benefit, chiefly by two measures. First, by admission, in addition to the students pursuing the regular curriculum, of other students to a partial course under the students. students to a partial course, under certain regulations; and secondly, by the delivery of lectures at the college by the professors at night, for the benefit of persons who, desiring libe-ral instruction, are unable to enjoy it in the ordinary mode—the professors to determine the subjects and order of the course, and to make a mode-

of the course, and to make a mode-rate charge for it.

The Committee also recommend ed that, to meet the exigencies of the times, the charge to students be ten dollar per quarter.

The report of the Committee was adopted by the Board of Trustees, and will form the basis of future operations.
