THE PIRATE GEORGIAN IN CHANCERY. A bill has been filed by Morphy & Sullivan, solicitors, of Toronto, on behalf of the Government of the United States, against G. T. Denison, Jr., of Toronto, and others, to obtain possession of the propeller Georgian. It will be remembered that this vessel, the reputed owner of which is Denison, has been under seizure, on account of a suspected violation of the neutrality law. It is now claimed by the plaintiffs in this suit, as the successors of the Confederate Government, on the ground that the transfer to Denison from the agent of the Confederate States was a merely colorable one, and made for the purpose of defrauding the United States of their rights. The propeller was purchased from Smith & Co. by Lewis B. Bates, who is alleged to have been an agent of the Confedence of rate States for the purpose of making depredations on the lake coast of the United States, or assisting in the relief of Confederate prisoners, or otherwise helping the cause of the South. It is alleged that when the Southern cause began to look desperate, the Confederate agent made a transfer to Denison, in order that while in the hands of a British sub-ject it might be less liable to suspiwith its has displaced and succeeded. This case, which has excited a great deal of interest, will probably settle some very important questions in international law.
