**VISIT TO MR. DAVIS.**—The New York Herald's Fortress Monroe correspondent says: Jefferson Davis has recently been visited in his casemate prison, by his old spiritual adviser, the pastor of St. Paul's church in Richmond, who spent a day with him. The sacrament was administered to him and everything done that could be, by his old religious teacher and adviser, through Scriptural reading and prayer, to give him peace of mind and that cheerful content and resignation following the right kind of teaching and faith. During his imprisonment Mr. Davis' only religious attendant and adviser has been the Post Chaplain, Rev. Mr. Chivvis, a most amiable and excellent man, and worthy and devout clergyman. It was natural he should like to be attended by his old pastor, and no one will be inclined, I am sure, to blame him for asking the privilege of his attendance upon him, or find fault with the request being complied with.

**DISCHARGE OF CIVILIANS.**—General Grant has issued an order directing all department commanders to discharge at once all civilians employed in their commands, except clerks whose services cannot be dispensed with. In all cases where necessity requires a continuance of the work now performed by civilians, such as contract surgeons, wagon-masters, teamsters, &c., men will be detailed from the ranks for such duty.

A letter from the Paris correspondent of the Philadelphia Ledger, states that down to November 23d, the date of his letter, there had been sixty-six hundred deaths from cholera in that city. It also states that the milder form of the disease, known in Paris by the term cholera, had attacked nearly everybody during the damp, sultry weather that had been prevailing for the preceding five or six weeks.

**TRIAL FOR TREASON.**—The first treason case consequent upon the late rebellion is now being tried in the United States District Court of Tennessee, before Judge Trigg. The case is the United States vs. John S. Gamble, who was an enrolling officer under the Confederate Government in Blount County, East Tennessee. This is the first treason trial since the memorable Aaron Burr case.

**A NEW RAILROAD.**—It has been decided, to intersect the State of New York by a new railroad, whose termini shall be New York and Oswego respectively, and which shall traverse the intervening counties in a generally north-westerly and south-easterly direction.

Pius IX recently alighted from his carriage in the Piazza del Popolo, and traversed on foot the whole length of the Corso, the Broadway of Rome. The old men remarked that they had never seen a Pope on foot in the Corso before.

Hon. Philip Allen, formerly Governor of Rhode Island, and afterwards a United States Senator, died this morning at his residence in Providence.

A citizen from Matamoras, who was intimate there with the French officers, says that the latter apprehend a war between France and the United States.

A company has been organized in Spain for the purpose of laying a submarine telegraph cable between Cuba and the United States.

Paris trade suffered to the amount of one hundred millions of francs by the cholera panic.

General Scott arrived in New Orleans on the 14th. A salute was fired.
