

Foreign News. LONDON, June 16.—Despatches from Rome have no doubt of the adoption of the infallibility dogma. The French Emperor has rheumatism in his left leg. Prince Napoleon is also ill. PARIS, June 16.—The Emperor's gout is not serious. The Court goes to St. Cloud next week. Breadstuffs advanced rapidly at Paris; on account of the drought, bread which sold for seven pence in the middle of last winter, now sells for nine. MADRID, June 16.—According to the provisions of the lately enacted law, 9,000 registers of civil marriages will be opened by the middle of August. ROME, June 16.—The discussion of the last chapter of infallibility commenced to-day.

Domestic News. NEW YORK, June 17.—The steamer America takes out \$128,000 specie. Cooper Institute is crowded, to hear Red Cloud. He spoke half an hour. Peter Cooper presided, and made a speech, favoring a conciliatory policy toward the Indians. All available ship room has been rapidly taken up for transportation of breadstuffs for France. Princess Edith Montez has sued the female brokers Woodhull and Claflin, for a \$3,000 ring and \$2,000 in money, which she says she deposited with them. PHILADELPHIA, June 16.—A middle-aged woman died from chloroform, under the hands of a dentist, administered to pull a tooth. The abolitionists here are urging the Government to insist on the emancipation of the slaves in Cuba and other Spanish colonies. There is a rumor that the Marquis of Bute contemplated a return to the Anglican communion. The primary Republican elections have been quite stormy, indicating a split in the party. In some instances, chairs and chandeliers were broken, and the contesting parties driven from the stands. CLEVELAND, June 16.—The annual meeting of the Unitarian Conference commenced to-day. Attendance large. The Conference continues during the week. ALBANY, June 16.—The State Commissioners have declared the election of Sanford E. Church, Chief Judge, and M. F. Allen, Martin Grover, Rufus W. Packham and Thomas A. Rapello, Democrats, and Chas. J. Folger and Chas. Andrews, Republicans, Associate Justices. Church's majority is 87,972. SAN FRANCISCO, June 17.—The Costa Rican Government has overthrown Bruna; Carrago has been declared President. Five officers were killed during the conflict. The revolutionary attempt in San Salvador failed. The Secretary of the Supreme Court of New Grenada has been found guilty of forging Government bonds.

WASHINGTON, June 16.—In the House, the New York and Boston merchants petition for a draw-back on cotton shipped to China after June, 1868. Further petitions were presented for a uniform rate on tobacco. A bill putting coal on the free list was reported by the Committee of Ways and Means, and referred to the Committee of the Whole. Cuba was resumed. The Bingham amendment was adopted—103 to 86. A bill will be reported by the Reconstruction Committee, on the first opportunity, in original shape, viz: the Virginia bill, with the militia clause; when the previous question will be moved; it will lie with the House whether the amendments allowed by the Judiciary Committee will be heard. Hear has resigned the Attorney-Generalship. The following is the shape in which Cuba was finally disposed of. Resolved, That the President is hereby authorized to remonstrate against the barbarous manner in which the war in Cuba has been conducted, and if he shall deem it expedient, to solicit the co-operation of other Governments in such measure as he may deem necessary to secure from both contending parties an observance of the laws of war, recognized by all civilized nations. Internal revenue receipts to-day \$698,000. The Secretary of the Interior telegraphed Red Cloud that the Government fully consented to give his party the seventeen horses asked for. Red Cloud telegraphed back that his heart had been made very big. There are rumors of other Cabinet changes. In the Senate, a bill was reported, giving \$300,000 subsidy to the California and Australia steamship line, contingent upon Australia giving the same amount. A bill was introduced, providing for transportation of goods in bond from ports of entry to points of delivery. A bill establishing a Department of Justice passed, and goes to the President. The bill which passed the House regulating the currency, was read the first and second times, and referred to the Committee on Finance. Robertson asked leave to take up a bill removing political disabilities, covering 5,000 names. Sumner said the bill was of too wholesale a character, and was postponed—28 to 23. The franking privilege was resumed, and an amendment continuing the present arrangements for the exchange and delivery of newspapers, passed—36 to 170; without final action, adjourned. The House ordered Woods to Richmond, to testify, in accordance with the recommendation of the Judiciary Committee.
