

THE JEWS had shown themselves worthy of these privileges.

All the inhabitants of Bordeaux sympathized with the Grand Rabbi, and even the Cardinal Archbishop of Bordeaux paid a congratulatory visit to Mous Marx.

INTERESTING FACTS.—Man has the power of imitating almost every motion but that of flight. To effect these he has, in his maturity and health, 60 bones in his head, 60 in his thighs and legs, 62 in his arms and hands, and 67 in his trunk. He has also 437 muscles. His heart makes 64 pulsations in a minute, and therefore 3,840 in an hour, 92,160 in a day. There are also three complete circulations of his blood in the short space of an hour. In respect to the comparative speed of animated beings and of inanimated bodies, it may be remarked that size and construction seem to have little influence, nor has comparative strength, though one body giving any quantity of motion to another is said to lose so much of its own. The sloth is by no means a small animal, and yet it can travel only 50 paces in a day; a worm crawls only five inches in 50 seconds; but a lady bug can fly 20,000,000 times its own length in less than an hour. An elk can run a mile and a half in seven minutes; an antelope a mile in a minute; the wild mule of Tartary has a speed ever greater than that. An eagle can fly ten leagues in an hour; and a canary falcon can even reach 250 leagues in fifteen hours. A violent wind travels 60 miles an hour; sound, 1,142 English feet in a second.

NEW LIQUOR LAW IN RHODE ISLAND.—A very stringent liquor bill has been introduced into the Rhode Island House of Representatives—it makes manufacturers or sellers of spirituous liquors, unless town agents, liable for the first offence to fine and costs and three months imprisonment in the county jail, and, on further conviction for the same offence, to imprisonment for six months. For adulterating liquors, so as to render them more injurious, a person is liable to a fine of \$100, and imprisonment for one year at least. Complaints are to be on oath, and search warrants are to be issued by justices of the peace.

A LONG LINE.—In advocating a direct throughfare through our own territory from the Mississippi to the Pacific, instead of the Teuantepec route through a foreign territory, Mr. Seward states that the railroad of New alone, if stretched out in one continuous chain, would reach a distance two-thirds as great as that which separates the Mississippi from San Francisco. And, further, that the railroad already made in the United States, if extended in one continuous chain, would cover a distance as great as that which divides Liverpool from Canton, and together with roads now constructing, would encircle the globe.
