I commenced feeding my fattening hogs with my poorest quality of corn, of which they always waste more or less, and clean this apartment every day into the lower apartment, which furnishes feed enough for the hogs designed for keeping through the winter. I usually fat about ten hogs and kill them in the early part of the winter, and keep about six through till the next season for fatting, and usually make from thirty to forty loads of manure from them, which is worth double the quantity of the best barn-yard or cattle manure. I generally supply it to my corn erop, and usually a shovel full in the hill, unless the soil is of a light and poor quality, and upon much soil I consider it a damage to the crop; for it starts a vigorous and large stalk, and as soon as the roots extend beyond the manure in the hill there is not nutriment in the soil for more than sufficient to nourish the large stalk, when if the stalk had been smaller there would have been virtue enough in the soil to feed in and produce

an ear of corn. I have also found this a most valuable ma nure for all kinds of garden vegetal partie ularly melons, and excellent for gravines and all kinds of fruit tress. Onions .- We have promised our Florida friends to keep them advised of how to make onions from the black seed. Those who have not planted, should lose no time now in doing so. A rich sandy soil suits the onion best, but they will grow in any good soil that can be kept mellow. Ashes are a good manure for onions, and a top dressing of gypsum during heir growth is a wonderful invigorator. Soak the seed twenty-four hours before planting. Plant in drills fourteen to eighteen inches apart; drop a single seed four inches apart in he drills, and cover about half an inch; press the earth firmly upon the seed, and if they all come up, thin out every other one; keep the soil well stirred during their growth, but be careful how the niggers use the hoe We have had fine patches of onions much retarded in their growth by the injudicious use of the hoe. By the time the stalks are as large as the little finger, the roots will have threaded the whole space between the rows, and deep culture after that is ruinous. Neither should the stalks be broken down as some recommend, to "make them bottom." The top is as necessary for the perfection of the bulb as the root: in neither case has it anything to spare. There is no manure that tells better upon the onion crop than hen manure, but do not put it into a two inch drill; spade it over the whole ground, that the roots in their travels may find it .-Buttons and sets may also yet be planted with | Early York the same culture.

# From the Daller Newspaper.

Forest Leaves for Manure. A correspondent from Old Point Comfort Va., inquires of some of the contributors of your valuable Newspaper, if forest leaves make a good manure? In reply, I will give you my experience and practice, which will answer all his inquiries.

In the fall of the year, which is the most convenient time for gathering them, I am in the habit of drawing leaves and throwing into my hog house enough to keep it well littered with them, which is situated upon a side hill, and consists of two apartments; one deignated for my fatting hogs intended for wintering, which last are in the lower pen, which is somewhat larger than the other.
