

ly, of Fillmore and Seward can no more intermingle in a party combination than oil and water will intermingle. In the State of New York three-fifths of the whigs have vastly stronger freesoil than whig proclivities, and in most of the northern States the same remark holds good.

It is manifest, then, that the hydra of abolitionism, fanaticism, and disunionism, is about to rear itself as the dominant opposition party in the country. This monster of frightful mien—this party made up of white abolitionists, black abolitionists, and fugitives from slavery—this rabble of discord and destruction, is organizing its motley forces for a desperate assault upon the democratic party and upon the constitution itself.—*Detroit Free Press.*

THE BOUNDARY QUESTION. The disputed Boundary Line between New Mexico and Chihuahua, having excited some attention, the New York *Courier & Enquirer* gives the following particulars in regard to the region in dispute.

"Gov. Lane's line is on the parallel of 31. 52, and extends westwardly from the Rio Grande, at 106 deg. 45 min., to the point 109 deg. 45 min. W. longitude.

The treaty line—the line agreed upon by the Joint Commission according to Disturnel's Map, referred to, and incorporated into the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, is on the parallel of 32 deg. 22 min., running due West from the Rio Grande, at about 106 deg. 50 min., to the point 109 deg. 50 min. W. longitude. The line claimed by Gen. Conde, the Mexican Commissioner, diverges northward from the treaty line above described, at or near 107 deg. 40 min. W. runs north for 40 min. of latitude, and then in a North-western direction to the Rio Gila.

"The territory which forms the subject of the issue between Gov. Lane and the Commission, is about thirty miles in breadth, from North to South.

The line position of El Paso, which in the treaty map was placed at 32 deg. 15 min. is now ascertained, it is said, to be at 31 deg. 45 min. North latitude."

Speaking of bees, the *Mobile Tribune* says: Such of our readers as are engaged in the bee culture will be glad to learn that a remedy has been discovered which effectually prevents the ravages of the bee-moth. The frequent and serious injury caused by this pestiferous insect has deterred many persons from entering into the business of raising bees, more especially in some localities the ravages have been so great as nearly to destroy both bees and honey. The plan is this: split joints of cane through the center and arrange them on the four sides of the hive, with the split side resting on the platform. The moth, instead of depositing its eggs under the edge of the hive, will lay them under the split cane. From these depositories they may be removed and destroyed as often as necessary, with little trouble. A friend informs us that he knows the plan has been tried and found entirely successful.

President Pierce's Personal Habits.—The Washington correspondent of the New York *Courier*, says of Gen. Pierce, "that he drinks no wine, and those who enjoy an individual personal acquaintance with him say that the movements and affections of his latter years, and the pressure of the onerous public duties, since his election, have impressed him with a deep sense of religious responsibility, and given a tinge of gravity to his character which forms an observable contrast with the audacious vivacity of his temperament at an early period of his life." Those papers that charge him before his election with habits of intemperance, committed a cruel act—a crime which he was as wicked as it was false and malicious.
