THE MARKET GARDENERS ROUND LONDON. -The extent of gardens round London required to supply the two millions and a quarter of eaters will hardly be credited. Within a radius of fifteen miles of London, there are 200,000 acres of land in the hands of market gardeners, all laboring for the London market : 10,000 loads of turnips, 10,000 sacks of peas, 20,000,000 heads of celery, 40,000,000 cabbages, and 100 tons of water-cresses, are said to be sold annually in Covent Garden market alone, to say nothing of the potatoes, carrots, beets, onions, herbs of all kinds, &c., which are sold in immense quantities.

And I hereby further invite and request all people to lay aside on that day their usual business and worldly avocations, and to observe with solemnity the religious rites which are herein mentioned.
