ARRIVAL OF THE ATLANTIC. NEW-YORK, Nov. 29.—The steamship Atlantic has arrived from Liverpool with dates to the 16th instant.

The sales of Cotton at Liverpool for the three days amount to 15,000 bales, of which Speculators took 2000, and Exporters 1000 bales.
