

TELEGRAPHIC INTELLIGENCE.

From the Charleston Mercury. Arrival of the Humboldt.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 7.—The U. S. Mail Steamship Humboldt has arrived with dates from England to the 23d.

The Queen of Portugal died on the 15th. The retreat of the Turks across the Danube is officially confirmed.

The latest reports the Russians had evacuated Losser Wallachia, and that the Russian fleet was dismantled and had gone into winter quarters.

The Turks had received large reinforcements from every direction.

It was reported that the Russian Ambassadors at London and Paris had orders to demand their passports if the combined fleets remained in the Bosphorus.

Austria and Prussia had formally announced their determination to remain neutral.

By the latest reports the Russians were beaten back in Circassia.

At Vienna the editors had received warning not to publish anything to provoke Russia.

The Turks were strongly fortified at Kalafat, and the Russians marching to attack them.

The Turks were sending succor to the Circassians.

The Czar is reported to be sick.

The Turks have established a camp on the Serbian frontier, and commenced throwing a bridge across the Drina.

The Servians are determined on resistance.

Flour was in good demand in Liverpool at 1s. 6d. advance, and Wheat at 1s.

The steamship Humboldt is a total wreck. The cargo will be saved, partly damaged.

At Liverpool, the sales of Cotton on Monday, 20th, were 6000 bales, on Tuesday, 4000.

The market was rather heavy, but there was no change in prices. Flour had receded, and the late improvement was lost.

From Halifax we learn that the tide ebbs and flows in the Humboldt, and there is little doubt she will prove a total wreck.

Two hundred passengers and the goods were saved in good order. The mails will be forwarded by the Niagara.

Mr. Westerveld, the builder, is expected to be the heaviest loser, probably to the extent of sixty thousand dollars.

The stock of the company is scattered, and it is supposed that several of the owners are covered by insurance.

The cargo is heavily insured in New York, and the amount insured in Boston is \$40,000.

There was a great riot at Erie, Pa., to-day, on account of an attempt to attempt to alter the gauge of the Railroad from the State line.

Cannon were fired, and the people turned out and tore up the tracks, and stopped the trains.

The Depot was taken possession of by the mob, and the Depot master barely escaped with life.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—In the Senate to-day, the Rev. Henry Slicer was elected Captain on the fourth ballot.

Various notices of new bills were given. Mr. Fish offered a resolution of inquiry into the mortality on board of emigrant ships.

The resolution of Mr. Clayton, respecting the modification of the Judiciary, were adopted.

In the House, Gen. Armstrong was elected printer, and Rev. Henry Milburne, Chaplain.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 8.—The insurance on the Humboldt in New York is estimated at \$60,000.

There has been no more rioting at Erie, but the people are determined to have their way.

It is reported that the Attorney General of the State has signed a petition for an injunction against the trains unning from the Ohio State line to Erie.

The authorities however are determined to carry out the law.

Arrival of the Niagara. The steamship Niagara has arrived at Halifax, with dates to the 26th ult.

The sales of cotton for the week were 41,000 bales, of which Speculators took 5750 and Exporters 2750.

The market is firm, but prices are unchanged with the exception of lower qualities, which are a shade higher.

Brown and Shipley quote Fair Orleans, 6 3/4; Middling, 6; Fair Mobile, 6 1/2; Middling, 5 7/8; Fair Uplands, 6 3/8; Middling, 5 3/4; Inferior American, 3 1/2 a 4 1/4.

The demand is good and prices stiffer. The stock on hand exclusive of what is on shipboard, 650,000 bales.

At Havre the sales of Cotton for the week ending 23d, were 4000 bales, with a moderate demand, and prices in favor of the buyer.

On the 25th quotations advanced 1/2. Flour had declined.

The Turkish successes in Asia continue, but for the present hostilities had ceased along the Moldavian and Wallachian frontier, on account of heavy floods, but it was believed they would soon be renewed, as the Turkish and Russian commanders had received orders from their respective Governments to prosecute the war vigorously.

Diplomacy is said to be again active, but the Porte is said to have declined the consideration of the new Anglo-French note, which contained more comprehensive propositions, prepared at Paris by Napoleon.

It is stated that England and France have framed a project, in which they will invite the co-operation of other powers.

If the Austrian statements are reliable, the Czar is amicably disposed.

The latest letters from Constantinople of the 10th state that the movement on Oltenetz was only a point to draw off the attention of Kortschakoff, and that Omer Pacha was concentrating a large force to attack Luder's division in Bessarabia, in which the fleet in the Black Sea will co-operate with the land forces.

The Porte had received assurance of effective aid from the British and French Ambassadors in case of need.

The Paris Patria has a despatch from Vienna of the 21st, which states that the Russian army had received orders to act on the offensive, and to cross the Danube.

The Pacha of Egypt had prohibited the exportation of grain.

Gov. Foote has issued an address declining to be a candidate for United States Senator, as he is convinced that there is a majority in the Legislature against him.

Gen. Foote, in his address, says that the Union men became discouraged by the elevation of a secessionist to the Cabinet—an officer who, by the honest but too confiding President, was allowed to use the Executive patronage for overthrowing the Union party. Had it not been for the Bond question, Gov. Foote says he would have triumphed over Federal interference.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 10.—The Cotton market was brisk after the arrival of the Niagara's advices, and nearly 8000 bales were sold, at an advance of 1-8 a 1-4 on the lower qualities.

The stock on hand is 200,000 bales. Prime Molasses, 19.

The Mayor has issued a proclamation declaring the health of the city was never better. The weather is cold, with frost.

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—The sales of cotton to-day amounted to 4000 bales, of which 550 were for export, and 70 on speculation.

Flour is easier and Grain firmer. The large printing and publishing house of Harper & Brothers, comprising seven buildings on Cliff and Pearl streets, is on fire and it is feared will prove a total loss, and it is supposed several lives have been lost.

FINE COTTON.—The Augusta Constitutionalist says: We were shown yesterday, by Messrs. Beall & Stovall, a sample of eleven bales of Cotton, being a portion of the upland crop raised by J. Spear, of Abbeville District, S. C., for which they obtained eleven and a quarter cents.

Six of the bales were choice, and five could be ranked fully fair. If the remainder of Mr. Spear's crop prove as good as the above eleven bales, it will command a fancy's price.
