No news by Telegraph this morning.

CLARENDON.—The Postoffice at Fulton, in this District, has been discontinued.

The Washington hospitals are said to be terribly crowded, and the mortality very large.

Indium, the last "new metal," so far as our reports from the world outside in form us, closely resembles zinc, and was first found at Frieberg.

The latest that we have from the Morganton raiders is that they were flying for life, with a force of a thousand in pursuit; about fifty had been captured.

General GARDNER, captured near Port Hudson, says the Yankee papers, has been sent from Fort Lafayette to General FOSTER, in front of Charleston.

A late New York paper gives an account of an exciting horse race on the Fashion Course. The horse named *Stonewall Jackson* beat all his competitors—among them one named *General Grant*—in three successive heats.

Information from the enemy's lines in Georgia reports much dissatisfaction among the Yankees, and SHERMAN is calling for reinforcements. They say JOHNSON has an overwhelming force, and he can not take Atlanta, but must retreat unless more troops are sent to him.

Our exchanges inform us that Capt. CAMILLE GIRARDY has introduced to the citizens of Augusta, a machine for making ice. It is the invention of M. CARRIE, of France, and is the same which has supplied the cafes and restaurants of Paris. Capt. GIRARDY has secured the patent right for the Confederacy, and will manufacture these machines to order.

Can't some enterprising citizen of Camden introduce one of them here? Oh for a julep!

The New Nation, a paper, published in New York as the organ of the Radical Republicans makes the following estimate of GRANT'S losses, previous to the later operations on the Chickahominy. The editor, General CLUSERET, an old French officer, writing about the attack on LEE on the 4th of June, says:

We lost seventy-five hundred men, and to his report the Adjutant-General adds the consolatory words that he hopes our losses will not exceed these figures. By adding this loss, to the seventy-five thousand men set down in previous numbers, we have an aggregate loss of eighty-two thousand five hundred men, from the fifth of May to the fifth of June, 1864, and all for the satisfaction of marching from Germania Ford to Bethesda Church, to witness the traces of similar movements, made by McClellan three years before upon precisely the same ground, the disastrous results of which have already been exceeded, although we have not gained one inch of ground near the defenses of Richmond, but have simply reached the points reached by McClellan without being successful. If this be progress, it is progress of a wretched species.

The Montreal correspondent of the Charleston Courier, commenting on this, remarks:

General CLUSERET'S estimate of 82,500 men killed, wounded and missing, is made up from the different reports of the newspaper correspondents, who would be likely rather to underestimate the losses. I think we may safely calculate the losses of the Yankee armies, since the spring campaign opened, as follows:

Men.	
Grant's army up to the crossing of the James	100,000
Sherman's army to June 5	25,000
Butler's losses on the Southside	12,000
Siegel and Hunter in the Valley	6,000
Banks' army on the Red River	20,000
Steele's losses in Arkansas	4,000
Raid of Morgan, Wheeler and Forrest	15,000

Total. 182,000
This does not include the enemy's losses in Florida, on the North Carolina Coast, in Sherman's Mississippi raid, and in Thomas' demonstration against Dalton in March. The figures would mount beyond 200,000 if we had the complete reports.

Morgan's Kentucky Campaign.

We have been permitted, says the *Chronicle and Sentinel*, to copy the following official dispatch which was forwarded to Richmond, and copied there by a gentleman who arrived in this city yesterday:

CYNTHIANA, KY., June 10,
via ALEXANDON, June 20,

Entered Kentucky through Pound Gap.—met the enemy 1200 strong, crossed and forced him to burn his stores and supplies; moved to Mt. Sterling, surprised and captured garrison of 400 men, all their supplies, &c. Moved next morning to Lexington, attacked and captured the city, taking prisoners, stores and 1500 horses. Burnt Government depot, &c. Moved at 11 o'clock by Georgetown to Cynthiana; enemy under Col. Barry. Was forced to burn a large portion of the town. Col. B. was killed; the town surrendered with 400 prisoners. Gen. Hobson marched up at 2 o'clock from Cincinnati; captured him, staff, and 2000 prisoners, three trains laden with stores, &c. Maj. Chenoweth destroyed railroad between Lexington and Boyd's station. Capt. Jenkins destroyed railroad between Frankfort and Lexington. Capt. Cooper took fortifications and Frankfort. Capt. Everette took Maysville. People ready and anxious to strike for the South.
