

OBITUARY.

Capt R. E. ELLIOTT was mortally wounded near Gaines' Mill June 3d 1864, and died June 5th. This sad announcement brought sorrow to the hearts of his beloved family, and many admiring friends. No purer patriot or nobler gentleman has fallen in this struggle. I desire to pay a feeble tribute to his worth as a man, his skill as a soldier, and his devoted fidelity to his country and family. An association of three years in the capacity of friend and fellow soldier, amid the fatigues of camp, and the dangers of the field, qualifies me to speak.

He was born in Beaufort District S. C., and was in the thirtieth year of his age. After the usual academic and collegiate course he chose the profession of Medicine, devoted himself assiduously to its practice and was fast distinguishing himself in it. When the angry cloud of political trouble burst, and South Carolina called her sons to her defence, he sprang to her aid with all the fervor of a brave heart true to the memory of those ancestors who had illustrated the fame of his native state from the sacred desk, in the Cabinet, and on the tented field. Thenceforth to him there could be no home, no ease, no quiet until the independence and nationality of his country were established. To achieve these objects he devoted his life and talents. In January 1861 he joined the Palmetto Guard of Charleston, commanded by Capt. Cuthbert, and at once entered active service on the islands adjacent to that city. He was at this time a private in that noble company whose ranks now, shattered and thinned attest their gallantry and devotion to the cause of liberty; whose career is identified with our history from Sumter to the present time; and whose hallowed dead lie on the bloody fields of old Virginia. He passed successively from private to 1st Lieutenant, and, at the death of the chivalric Cuthbert, succeeded to the command of his company. Although often solicited to enter the Medical Department, where his ability, impartiality, and truthfulness would have insured him a high position, he preferred the sterner duties of the soldier, the responsibilities of the officer, and the storm of battle. So strict was he in adherence to this principle that, on being requested once by the commanding officer of his Regiment to act as assistant Surgeon, on the eve of an important engagement, he respectfully but positively declined, and received a severe wound in the conflict which followed. There are in every regiment certain men who are regarded as its bravest, staunchest and best soldiers; men who from their character and ability give it tone and standing. Among such in the 2d Regt., Kershaw's Brigade, Elliott stood prominent and conspicuous. No man could fail to respect him. He had the implicit confidence of all his superiors, and subordinates. He occupied the extreme left of his Regiment, and his commanding officers ever felt that all was well there. Possessed of a good physical constitution, and cheerful mind he endured privations and toils without murmuring, and by his example of patient endurance adorned alike the musket and the sword. A soldier alone can properly appreciate the meaning of this compliment. As a soldier he was enduring, cheerful and prompt; as an officer, capable, strict, energetic; as a man, candid, conscientious, and just. His name was the synonym of courage, and amid the smoke of twenty battle-fields his clarion voice cheered and comforted his men.

Alas! that he should have fallen after having survived so many dangers and endured so many hardships. He fell with his face to the foe, and his heart full of that patriotic fire, which had sustained him amid all of his trials. His memory is a precious legacy to his family and friends, who have strong hopes that their loss is his eternal gain. His family have lost a devoted member; his friends a cherished companion, and his country a brave defender. And when Carolina writes the record of her noble dead and erects the monumental shaft to commemorate their deeds, the name of Elliott will stand forth bright and beautiful, among those whom she has contributed to the defence of her rights and institutions.
