Among the many brave men who have fallen during the bloody struggle, and have attested their devotion to their country, by the sacrifice of their lives, upon her altar, we number our beloved friend, Lieut. WILLIAM McSWAIN, who was seriously wounded at Drewry's Bluff, Va., on the 16th of May, 1864, and died in the Wayside Hospital at Weldon, N. C., on the 2d of June 1864.

He was a resident of Kershaw District, S. C., and when the bloody conflict had fairly commenced, he nobly responded to the call of his country.

He was first Lieutenant in company F, 7th S. C. Battalion, where he discharged his duty faithfully, as an officer; and as a friend, was ever kind, and obliging.

No one could be taken from us whose loss would be more deeply lamented. No prouder patriot has shed his life's blood to ensure our independence, than the subject of this memento.

His sacred remains lie entombed near by the Roanoke River, where the fierce call to arms can never break his soft repose; but his immortal soul we humbly trust through the merits of a crucified Redeemer, is safe in that beautiful country above where wars never come, and grief and death cannot enter.

Good son, affectionate brother, kind master, true friend, pure patriot, brave soldier, noble gentleman; farewell!
