

Cure of Tigh in Two Hours.

Boil one part of quick lime with two parts of sublimed sulphur in ten parts of water until the two former are perfectly united. During ebullition it must be constantly stirred with a piece of wood, and when the sulphur and lime have united the fluid is to be decanted and kept in a stoppered bottle. Wash the body with warm water, and then rub the liquid into the skin thoroughly. During the evaporation of the fluid, a layer of sulphur is deposited which kills the acarus, and the patient is cured. It is only needful then to wash the body well and to use clean clothing.

The time is of no importance in the treatment except to render the sulphur soluble, and such would probably be the case if Potassa or Soda were employed.

This form of using sulphur, though not intended as anything new to the professional, is doubtless so to many others, who may take it at its value. In the treatment of over a hundred and fifty cases in the army within the past three or four months, I have rarely found a second application necessary to eradicate the disease.
