GENERAL ORDERS NO. 8.

I. THE MILITIA OF THE STATE, INCLUDING all persons who are liable to actual service in times of invasion, will hold themselves in readiness for active service on the shortest notice.

II. The commanding officers of Regiments who have failed to make returns in pursuance of General Orders No. 7, will proceed to do so immediately, and complete the organization of their respective commands, as therein directed.

III. Volunteer companies of mounted men or of infantry, organized in pursuance of orders heretofore issued from this office, will be accepted and armed.

IV. The commanding officers of Regiments (the ranking officer of the line where there are no Field Officers) are charged with the prompt extension of this order to their respective commands without further notice.

A PROCLAMATION.



EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,

COLUMBIA, S. C., July 21, 1864.

By his Excellency M. L. BONHAM, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the State of South Carolina.

WHEREAS INFORMATION HAS BEEN RECEIVED at this Department that an atrocious murder was committed on the 11th instant upon the body of ELIAS GRANTHAM, a Deputy Sheriff of Marion District, whilst in the discharge of his duties as such Deputy; and that NICHOLAS W. GADDY, CHARLES TART, and DAVID BEASLEY, a free person of color, stand charged with said murder, and that said persons have fled from justice:

Now, know ye, that to the end justice may be done, and that said GADDY, TART and BEASLEY may be brought to legal trial for their offence, as aforesaid, I do hereby offer a reward of Two Thousand Dollars for the apprehension and delivery of the three offending parties in any jail in this State, or One Thousand Dollars for NICHOLAS W. GADDY, the principal offender, and Five Hundred Dollars each for the others. When last heard from they were in Horry District, near Gallivant's Ferry.

Gaddy was born in Marion District, is about 35 years of age, 5 feet 10 or 11 inches high, grey eyes, auburn hair, rather sallow complexion, stoops a little in the shoulders, usually wears his hair long—by occupation a farmer and millwright.

Tart, born in same District, is a youth of about 16 years of age, well grown, rather fair complexion, dark hair, eyes believed to be blue.

Beasley, born in Richmond county, N. C., bright mulatto, thick set, weight from 160 to 180 pounds, from 45 to 50 years of age, 5 feet 11 or 12 inches high, kinky hair, and of reddish, sun-burnt appearance—by occupation a carpenter—has lived about Fayetteville and Lumberton, N. C.
