Boykin, he served from that time until April last in this State; when his company was transferred to Virginia and attached to the 7th S. C. Cávalry. He was untiring in the discharge of duty, and over ready to undertake anything, however ardnous or hazardous. Devoting his whole energy to the ser-vice, he was beloved by his communes for his manliness, impartiality and courage. His character was of that mild yet firm order which quietly makes friends, but grasps them with hooks of steel, and in the course of life developes into a solid, weful type, conducing to the good of society and the cultivation of the higher

He was truthful, candid and generous. His heart was the centre of pure emotion, high purposes and elevated sentiments, surmounted with a profound respect for everything sacred. His mind was bright and cultivated, giving promise of rich fruit. As a son and brother he was affectionate, as a friend, true and sincere-moral, upright and reverential, we believes that his soul is basking in the smallight of heaven. Alas that he should have fallen to the hirshold of life, when his promises were so bright and his future radiant with happiness and good. He has been transplanted, we trust, to those lands where in augel company he will develope those qualities of heart and mind which cudear d him alike to family and friends.

THE ATTENTION OF PERSONS EXEMPTED or detailed for agricultural purposes, and who have given bond to the Government, is directed to the Collowing paragraph from Circular No. 21, Bareau of

2. The sale to the Government, or to the families of soldiers, at prices fixed by the Commissioners of the State under the Impresement Acts, of the marketable supplies remaining after furnishing the Government with the stipulated quantity of provisions, and which he may raise from your to year while his exemption continues, as made, by the Act of Congress, approved February 17, 1864, one of the conditions of exemption allowed to an overseer or agriculturist. A claim is asserted by some of those exempted as grienturists to exchange such part of the aloresaid surplus as they may please for supplies of provisions, clothing and the like, to be consumed in family use, and to sell to the Government or the families of soldiers only what may romain of such surplus after making such exchanges. This claim is in violation of law, and of their contract with the Government, and cannot be allowed.

"Upon satisfactory evidence being furnished that persons exempted as overseers or agriculturists have or are thus disposing of their surplus productions by exchange as aforesaid, Enrolling Officers will arrest all such persons, lorward them to their nearest Camps of Instruction, to be retained there until final action shall be taken and appropried in their cases, and forward through the proper channels of communication to this Bureau a report of all the facts and circumstances of each case.

"Every agriculturist or overseer, upon receiving his certificate of exemption, should be informed that the action indicated above will be taken in the event of his not disposing of his marketable surplus in accordance with the requirements of law.?

If. Officers and agents of the subsistence and Quartermasters' Departments are requested to communicate information to the Enrolling Officer of all instances coming to their knowledge in which persons exempted or detailed for agricultural purposes have violated the stipulations of their bonds to the Government in the stipmations of their marketable surplus.

Slave Labor for the Coast,

'DIVISION NO. 2.

COMMISSIONERS OF ROADS AND THE town authorities within the Judicial Districts of Lancaster, Kershaw, Chesterfield, Darlington, Marlington, Marion, Sumter, Clarendon, Williamsburg, and Horry, will torthwith summon all slaveholders within their respective limits to deliver ONE-HALF of their slaves, hable to road duty, at the Railroad depots nearest their residence, on TUESDAY THE 27TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER NEXT, at 8 o'clock, a. m., there to await transportation to Charleston, for thirty days labor on the fortifications.

11. The Confederate authorities have made a requisi-

ion upon the State for Two Thousand laborers monthly. The proportion of one-fourth heretofore called for, had failed to supply half of this number. In view of this face and the great urgeliev of the designd for labor at this time, it is deemed expedient to shortengthe interval between the calls, and increase the quota. This is no violation of the law, for it does not fix the quota of labor, nor the interval between the calls, but prescribes that such proportion shall be called for as will fill the that such proportion shall be called for as will fill the requisition, giving tharly days notice. Each Division in the order fixed will be required to furnish this quota, and no injustice will be done to any.

III. All parties, whether individuals or companies, who own or employ more than one road hand, are required to furnish their quota, (one half) unless relieved

by detail from Department Headquarters. This can relieve only those hands permanently engaged on the specific work for which the detail was granted. Commissioners of roads will give their attention to this matter and report to this office.

IV. Great confusion exists from the imperfect manner in which the names of owners are given to agents at the several depots. It is the duty of one, or more of the Commissioners, to be present to verily the quota

of each owner, and prepare correct lists.

Within five days after delivery on this call they will please forward to this office names of defaulters in their respective divisions of roads.
