**GENERAL ORDERS NO. 9.**

ALL PERSONS LIABLE TO ACTUAL SERVICE out of their Districts in times of invasion and insurrection will assemble on SATURDAY, the 10th of September, instant, at their usual regimental parades, and the senior officer in the regiment will take command, and will enroll every man in the regiment liable to service as above. On MONDAY, the 12th instant, the troops composing the 4th and 12th regiments, supplied with at least four (4) days rations, will proceed by the shortest and most expeditious route for the purpose of completing the organization of the troops for active service in the field to the following places of rendezvous, to-wit:

- The First Brigade, composed of the 1st, 2d, 3d, 4th, 5th and 42d Regiments, at Belton, in Anderson District, under Lt. Col. J. W. Harrison, A. D. C.
The Second Brigade, composed of the 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th and 19th Regiments, at Ninety-six Depot, under Lt. Col. William P. Butler, A. D. C.
The Third Brigade, composed of the 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th, 45th and 43d Regiments, at Branchville, under Lt. Col. A. P. Aldrich, A. D. C.
The Fourth Brigade, composed of the 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th Regiments, at Charleston, under Lt. Col. Wilmot G. DeSaussure, A. D. C.
The Fifth Brigade, composed of the 20th, 21st, 22d, 23d and 44th Regiments, at Camden, under Lt. Col. A. H. Boykin, A. D. C.
The Sixth Brigade, composed of the 24th, 25th, 26th and 27th Regiments, at Wainsboro, under Lt. Col. C. F. Hampton, A. D. C.
The Seventh and Eighth Brigades will be organized under subsequent orders.
The Ninth Brigade, composed of the 34th, 35th, 36th, 37th and 46th Regiments, at Union C. H., under Lt. Col. R. G. McCaw, A. D. C.
The Tenth Brigade, composed of the 38th, 39th, 40th, 41st and 45th Regiments, at Newberry C. H., under Lt. Col. W. D. Simpson, A. D. C.

II. All company officers will assemble at their usual regimental parades with accurate lists of the men in their respective companies liable to actual service, and will report all absentees to the commanders of their respective regiments when they meet at their brigade rendezvous.

III. The persons liable under this call are those between 16 and 17 years of age, aliens, exempts from Confederate service between 17 and 50 years of age during the continuance of such exemption, and persons who have been enrolled for Confederate service and detailed to remain at home in civil employments or pursuits, during the continuance of such detail, unless such detailed person shall be serving in some Confederate military organization.

IV. Those exempted under the existing State laws from actual service out of their respective districts, are earnestly urged to unite with this organization for the defence of the State. All who do not so unite will be organized by the commanding officers of regiments on Saturday, the 10th inst., for actual service in their respective districts, into companies of not less than sixty, (where practicable,) including commissioned officers and privates.

V. Officers will issue transportation tickets for all who travel by railroad, which tickets will be recognized by this Department.

VI. The Aids-de-Camp charged with the organization of the foregoing troops will call to their aid an assistant and a competent Surgeon to decide upon all cases of physical disability.

VII. The Officers and Cadets of the Arsenal and Citadel Academies will hold themselves in readiness for active service in the field on short notice.

VIII. The Aids-de-Camp of the Governor and all Militia Officers are charged with the prompt extension and execution of this order.

**Slave Labor for the Coast,**

COMMISSIONERS OF ROADS AND TOWNSHIP authorities within the Judicial Districts of Lancaster, Kershaw, Chesterfield, Darlington, Marlboro, Marion, Sumter, Cherokee, Williamsburg, and Horry, will forthwith summon all slaveholders within their respective limits to deliver ONE-HALF of their slaves, liable to road duty, at the Railroad depots nearest their residence, on TUESDAY THE 27TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER NEXT, at 8 o'clock, a. m., there to await transportation to Charleston, for thirty days labor on the fortifications.

II. The Confederate authorities have made a requisition upon the State for two thousand laborers monthly. The proportion of one-fourth heretofore called for, had failed to supply half of this number. In view of this fact and the great urgency of the demand for labor at this time, it is deemed expedient to shorten the interval between the calls, and increase the quota. This is no violation of the law, for it does not fix the quota of labor, nor the interval between the calls, but prescribes that such proportion shall be called for as will fill the requisition, giving thirty days notice. Each Division in the order fixed will be required to furnish this quota, and no injustice will be done to any.

III. All parties, whether individuals or companies, who own or employ more than one road hand, are required to furnish their quota, (one-half) unless relieved by detail from Department Headquarters. They can relieve only those hands permanently engaged on the specific work for which the detail was granted. Commissioners of roads will give their attention to this matter and report to this office.

IV. Great confusion exists from the imperfect manner in which the names of owners are given to agents at the several depots. It is the duty of one, or more of the Commissioners, to be present to verify the quota of each owner, and prepare correct lists.

Within five days after delivery on this call they will please forward to this office names of defaulters in their respective divisions of roads.
