REGIMENT SOUTH CAROLINA MILITIA, CAMDEN, S. C., Sept. 6th 1864.

**GENERAL ORDER NO. 10.**

PURSUANCE OF GENERAL ORDERS No. 10, from A. C. Garlington, Adjutant and Inspector of South Carolina, this Regiment is hereby ordered to parade in front of the Town Hall in Camden, S. C., on SATURDAY the 10th inst., at 10 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of organizing themselves into companies for active service in the field. All persons liable to actual service out of the District in times of invasion and insurrection will assemble as follows:

I. Those persons liable under this call are those between 16 and 17 years of age, aliens, exempts from Confederate service between 17 and 50 years of age, during the continuance of such exemption, and persons who have been enrolled from Confederate service and detailed to remain at home in civil employment or pursuits during the continuance of such detail, unless such detailed person shall be serving in some Confederate military organization.

II. Those exempted under the existing State laws from actual service out of the District are earnestly urged to unite with this organization for the defence of the State. All persons who do not so unite will be required on SATURDAY the 10th inst., for actual service, to organize into companies of not less than twenty (where practicable) including commissioned and uncommissioned officers and privates.

III. Captains or officers commanding Beat Companies will come prepared with accurate lists of their respective Companies.

IV. All persons liable for service in accordance with paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 of this order, will report to Headquarters on MONDAY the 12th instant, at 10 o'clock a. m.,—provided with four (4) days rations, for their organization.

V. Captains L. J. Patterson, John Thompson, Jno. W. Falkenberg, Adam Team, S. D. Hough, E. Blom, E. Parker, are charged with the extending this order.

VI. The field and staff officers are requested to be present at the Headquarters on Monday the 12th inst., at 10 o'clock a. m.

**PROCLAMATION.**

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, COLUMBIA, Sept. 5, 1864.

To the Citizens of South Carolina:

THE GALLANT ARMY OF TENNESSEE has been compelled by numbers to evacuate Atlanta. Whilst the Confederate authorities will doubtless do their duty through the Army and the State Reserves, now organized and in the field, under Brigadier General Chesnut, towards the defence of the State, the present military condition of the country requires that every man who can wield a weapon should be in some organization for the attainment of the same object.

The annexed orders provide for such organizations as the Executive is authorized to require under the law; and it is expected that every one who is liable will, without excuse, rally to the colors of the State in his appropriate organization.

But the force now most useful for all our military purposes is a mounted force; and that (it can only be voluntary). I conjure the yeomanry of the State, by every consideration of interest and patriotism at once to organize. Let it be formed without reference to age.—Many a man over 50 will make, as efficient a mounted soldier as others half his years. In '51 the State, then looking to the possible conflict which is now upon us, could boast as gallant a body of mounted men, many of them now over 50, as ever flashed a sabre in the face of a foe. Many of them are doing good in the field. Let those at home unite with their younger fellow citizens in organizing companies for mounted service. Each man must mount and equip himself, except as to a carbine, which, of the most approved kind, the State will furnish.

The horses (one to each officer and man) upon being registered with the Captains of Companies, as also the equipments, which (the horse and equipments) shall be used for military purposes, will be exempt from impressment, seizure, distress and execution.

If in a regiment or district enough do not unite to form a company, let them organize with from 15 to 30, electing a lieutenant, unite with some organization in another regiment or district, so as to make up a company and selecting a captain, determine the rank of their lieutenants by lot or otherwise. Upon the organization of companies having in the aggregate, including four (4) commissioned and eight (8) non-commissioned officers, not less than sixty-eight (68), they will be received and armed; and when the number of companies is sufficient, will be organized into battalions and regiments by the election of field officers.

All persons liable to service, who do not attach themselves to a mounted company, will be organized in one of the two classes embraced in the annexed order from the Adjutant and Inspector General's Office.

Citizens of South Carolina! You entered this contest resolved to live free or perish. Your brothers, sons and fathers of the army and State Reserves are already in the field. Place yourselves by their sides and make good your determination, that no foul mission of the despot Lincoln should ever pass, with impunity, his unhallowed footprint on the soil of your State. You have never wronged your foes. Make them rue the day they attempted to efface you from your heritage and give it to others. The ray of hope which some sanguine persons supposed they saw in the Chicago Convention has gone out in darkness. Be not deceived. There is no prospect of peace from that quarter. Peace is to be obtained alone, under the blessing of God, through your fortitude, your sacrifices and your own strong arms. Given under my hand and the seal of the State at Columbia, this 5th day of September, Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

**GENERAL ORDERS NO. 6.**

I. In pursuance of Paragraph V, General Orders No. 67, Adjutant and Inspector General's Office, 1864, companies for local defence are authorized and required to be organized in each District of the State.

II. All detailed men, unless specially excepted, including those between the ages of 18 and 45 years, as well as those of the Reserve class, and required to enroll themselves as members of companies.

III. The companies organized under this order are designed to be employed only in emergencies occurring in or near the Districts in which they may be respectively organized, nor will they be required to perform service except within the limits of their respective districts or districts contiguous thereto.

IV. The term of service of the companies will be the unexpired period of the war. The term of service of detailed men will be the terms of their respective details.

V. Local Enrolling Officers are charged with the execution of this order. They will organize the detailed men in their respective Districts into companies of not less than 64 men, and order an election for company officers, and, as each company is organized, they will forward muster rolls to these Headquarters. When the number of detailed men is not sufficient for a company, they will furnish a list of the names of the men.

VI. The provisions of the above order do not apply to the detailed men in the city of Columbia, they having already been organized into companies.

**GENERAL ORDERS NO. 9.**

I. ALL PERSONS LIABLE TO ACTUAL SERVICE out of their Districts in times of invasion and insurrection will assemble on SATURDAY, the 10th of September, instant, at their usual regimental parades, and the senior officer in the regiment will take command, and will enroll every man in the regiment liable to service as above. On MONDAY, the 12th instant, the troops composing the different regiments, supplied with at least four (4) days rations, will proceed by the shortest and most expeditious route for the purpose of completing the organization of the troops for active service in the field to the following places of rendezvous, to wit:

The First Brigade, composed of the 1st, 2d, 3d, 4th, 6th and 42d Regiments, at Belton, in Anderson District, under Lt. Col. J. W. Harrison, A. D. C.

The Second Brigade, composed of the 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th Regiments, at Ninety-six Depot, under Lt. Col. William P. Butler, A. D. C.

The Third Brigade, composed of the 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th, 15th and 43d Regiments, at Branchville, under Lt. Col. A. P. Aldrich, A. D. C.

The Fourth Brigade, composed of the 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th Regiments, at Charleston, under Lt. Col. Wilnot G. DeSausure, A. D. C.

The Fifth Brigade, composed of the 20th, 21st, 22d, 23d and 44th Regiments, at Camden, under Lt. Col. A. H. Boykin, A. D. C.

The Sixth Brigade, composed of the 24th, 25th, 26th and 27th Regiments, at Winnsboro, under Lt. Col. F. Hampton, A. D. C.

The Seventh and Eighth Brigades will be organized under subsequent orders.

The Ninth Brigade, composed of the 34th, 35th, 36th, 37th and 46th Regiments, at Union C. H., under Lt. Col. R. G. McCaw, A. D. C.

The Tenth Brigade, composed of the 38th, 39th, 40th, 41st and 45th Regiments, at Newberry C. H., under Lt. Col. W. D. Simpson, A. D. C.

II. All company officers will assemble at their usual regimental parades with accurate lists of the men in their respective beats liable to actual service, and will report all absentees to the commanders of their respective regiments when they meet at their brigado rendezvous.

III. The persons liable under this call are those between 16 and 17 years of age, aliens, exempts from Confederate service between 17 and 50 years of age during the continuance of such exemption, and persons who have been enrolled for Confederate service and detailed to remain at home in civil employments or pursuits, during the continuance of such detail, unless such detailed person shall be serving in some Confederate military organization.

IV. Those exempted under the existing State laws from actual service out of their respective districts, are earnestly urged to unite with this organization for the defence of the State. All who do not so unite will be organized by the commanding officers of regiments on Saturday, the 10th inst., for actual service in their respective districts, into companies of not less than sixty (where practicable,) including commissioned officers and privates.

V. Officers will issue transportation tickets for all who travel by railroad, which tickets will be recognized by this Department.

VI. The Aids-de-Camp charged with the organization of the foregoing troops will call to their aid an assistant and a competent Surgeon to decide upon all cases of physical disability.

VII. The Officers and Cadets of the Arsenal and Citadel Academies will hold themselves in readiness for active service in the field on short notice.

VIII. The Aids-de-Camp of the Governor and all Militia Officers are charged with the prompt extension and execution of this order.
