GENERAL ORDERS NO. 11.

THE MILITIA OFFICERS COMMANDING REGIMENTS and companies, and the Aids-de-Camp of the Governor, in the execution of General Order No. 10 from this office and of this order, will be governed by the following instructions, to wit: Brig. Gen. Chesnut, commanding Reserves of this State, having by General Order No. 6 (September 5, 1864), required all detailed men, including those between the ages of 18 and 45 years, as well as those of the reserve class, to be enrolled and organized for service; such persons will not be included in the organization of troops under General Order No. 10 from this office.

By "resident aliens," is intended such as were domiciled in the State at the time of issuing said orders, including such as have been residents of other States of the Confederacy, but who have come into the State to avoid military service elsewhere, and excluding transient aliens who have never been domiciled in the Confederacy.

Persons mentioned in the "Abstract on the Exemption Law of this State," heretofore published, will be included in the organization of companies for service beyond their Districts, and will not be required to report at the brigade rendezvous where they produce certificates of exemption from this office, or where they show their cause of exemption by affidavit (and other satisfactory proof in writing, if required,) to the commanding officers of regiments.

Applications for the exemption of railroad officers and employees, of overseers, of persons employed in the manufacture of arms, munitions of war, and supplies, of employees in paper mills, printing establishments and iron manufactories, will be referred to this office for final action, and all cases of exemption will be subject to revision at this office.

All certificates of physical disability heretofore granted by State Surgeons are revoked, and persons claiming exemption on that ground are required to appear for examination before the Surgeon appointed to act under the orders of the Aids-de-Camp at the brigade rendezvous, unless they shall be excused by the commanding officers of regiments, on account of inability to attend.

Paragraph No. 4 of General Order No. 10 is so amended that the persons who are not liable to service in their Districts, will continue in their beat company organizations, and all vacancies in company, battalion and regimental offices created by the organization made in pursuance of General Order No. 10 and these orders, will be filled by elections on SATURDAY, the 10th inst.

When the troops have assembled at the brigade rendezvous, the Aids-de-Camp will proceed to organize them into companies of not less than sixty-eight (68) and not more than one hundred (100) men, including the commissioned officers, by the election of one Captain and three Lieutenants to each company. And in forming the companies, regard will be had, as far as may be practicable, to the geographical proximity of the regiments.

The time fixed for the assembling of the troops at the brigade rendezvous, is 10 o'clock a. m., on TUESDAY next; and for such as go by railroad: the commanding officers of regiments will issue transportation orders.

ABSTRACT OF THE EXEMPTION LAW OF SOUTH CAROLINA.

Persons Exempt from all Militia Service. The Lieutenant-Governor; the Judges of the Court of Law and Equity; the Ordinaries; Clerks of the Courts of Common Pleas and General Sessions; Sheriffs; Masters, Commissioners and Registers in Equity; the Secretary of State; Surveyor-General; Comptroller-General, and Treasurers of the State.

Persons Exempt from Actual Service Beyond the Limits of the Districts in which they Reside.

The members of both branches of the Legislature and their respective officers, including the Attorney-General and the Solicitors of the State; persons in Confederate and State military service; Officers and Cadets of the State Military Academy; regularly officiating clergymen; regularly licensed practicing physicians, over the age of thirty-five years; one apothecary to each regularly established drug store which was in operation at the beginning of the war; officers and faculty of the South Carolina College, and professors in other incorporated colleges and theological schools, while such colleges and schools are in operation; the superintendent, teachers and steward of the Cedar Springs Asylum; schoolmasters over the age of forty years and who had under their charge not less than twenty scholars on the 17th day of December, 1863; branch pilots; one white man, over the age of forty-five years, to each established ferry, toll bridge or toll grain mill, if actually kept by such white man; the president, cashier and one teller, to each of the banks of the State; the treasurers of the savings institutions of the State; the officers and men of the city guard, and officers and forty men of each fire company of the fire departments of Charleston and Columbia; the superintendent and keeper of the Lunatic Asylum and their assistants; stewards or keepers of Poor Houses; the keepers of the arsenals of the State; persons holding office under the Confederate States, except deputy postmasters, (all are deputies whose appointments are not made by the President and confirmed by the Senate) all persons belonging to the boards of relief of soldiers' families, over the age of forty-five, or, if exempted by reason of physical infirmity from Confederate conscription. The officers and as many employees of each railroad company as the President or Superintendent may certify and show to the satisfaction of the Adjutant and Inspector-General to be necessary to the efficient conduct of its business, and that the duties of said employees cannot be discharged by slaves or free persons of color; all persons employed by the State or

Confederate Government in the manufacture of arms, munitions of war, and army supplies, or by contractors to furnish the same to the State or Confederate Government: Provided, It be shown to the satisfaction of the Adjutant and Inspector-General, that the public interest and military defenses require the exemption of such persons; one superintendent or manager of each salt work which yields at least ten bushels per day, and which had been in operation at least two months before such persons was called into service; overseers on plantations owned by persons absent in Confederate or State military service, or by persons over the age of sixty years, *femmes sole*, minors, and persons who are decrepit, (to be certified by a physician,) or of unsound mind, and on which there are exceeding fifteen actual working hands, and also on plantations where fifteen or more working hands are lost without any white male person to govern them, in which case the application must be recommended by the commanding officer of the beat and of the regiment.— Owners of plantations within five miles of each other, may join in an application for the exemption of a common overseer. All applications for the exemption of overseers must be made in writing, addressed to the Adjutant and Inspector-General, and be sworn to by the employer, or his or her agent, and the facts stated must also be verified by the affidavit of two other credible persons. Such persons and employees in each paper mill and newspaper or printing establishment, and iron manufactories, as the Adjutant and Inspector-General, with the approval of the Governor, may see fit to exempt from time to time.

Slave Labor for the Coast, DIVISION NO. 2.

COMMISSIONERS OF ROADS AND THE town authorities within the Judicial Districts of Lancaster, Kershaw, Chesterfield, Darlington, Marlboro, Marion, Sumter, Clarendon, Williamsburg, and Horry, will forthwith summon all slaveholders within their respective limits to deliver ONE-HALF of their slaves, liable to road duty, at the Railroad depots nearest their residence, on TUESDAY THE 27TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER NEXT, at 8 o'clock, a. m., there to await transportation to Charleston, for thirty days labor on the fortifications.

The Confederate authorities have made a requisition upon the State for Two Thousand laborers monthly. The proportion of one-fourth heretofore called for, had failed to supply half of this number. In view of this fact and the great urgency of the demand for labor at this time, it is deemed expedient to shorten the interval between the calls, and increase the quota. This is no violation of the law, for it does not fix the quota of labor, nor the interval between the calls, but prescribes that such proportion shall be called for as will fill the requisition, giving thirty days notice. Each Division in the order fixed will be required to furnish this quota, and no injustices will be done to any.

All parties, whether individuals or companies, who own or employ more than one road hand, are required to furnish their quota, (one-half) unless relieved by detail from Department Headquarters. This can relieve only those hands permanently engaged on the specific work for which the detail was granted. Commissioners of roads will give their attention to this matter and report to this office.

Great confusion exists from the imperfect manner in which the names of owners are given to agents at the several depots. It is the duty of one, or more of the Commissioners, to be present to verify the quota of each owner, and prepare correct lists.

Within five days after delivery on this call they will please forward to this office names of defaulters in their respective divisions of roads.

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, COLUMBIA, Sept. 5, 1864.

To the Citizens of South Carolina:

THE GALLANT ARMY OF TENNESSEE has been compelled by numbers to evacuate Atlanta. Whilst the Confederate authorities will doubtless do their duty through the Army and the State Reserves, now organized and in the field, under Brigadier General Chesnut, towards the defence of the State, the present military condition of the country requires that every man who can wield a weapon should be in some organization for the attainment of the same object.

The annexed orders provide for such organizations as the Executive is authorized to require under the law; and it is expected that every one who is liable will, without excuse, rally to the colors of the State in his appropriate organization.

But the force now most useful for all our military purposes is a mounted force; and that (it can only be voluntary). I conjure the yeomanry of the State, by every consideration of interest and patriotism at once to organize. Let it be formed without reference to age. Many a man over 50 will make as efficient a mounted soldier as others half his years. In '51 the State, then looking to the possible conflict which is now upon us, could boast as gallant a body of mounted men, many of them now over 50, as ever flashed sabre in the face of a foe. Many of them are doing good in the field. Let those at home unite with their younger fellow citizens in organizing companies for mounted service. Each man must mount and equip himself, except as to a carbine, which, of the most approved kind, the State will furnish.

The horses (one to each officer and man) upon being registered with the Captains of Companies, as also the equipments, which (the horse and equipments) shall be used for military purposes, will be exempt from impressment, seizure, distress and execution.

If in a regiment or district enough do not unite to form a company, let them organize with from 15 to 30, electing a lieutenant, unite with some organization in another regiment or district, so as to make up a company and selecting a captain, determine the rank of their lieutenants by lot or otherwise. Upon the organization of companies having in the aggregate, including four (4) commissioned and eight (8) non-commissioned officers, not less than sixty-eight (68), they will be received and armed; and when the number of companies is sufficient, will be organized into battalions and regiments by the election of field officers.

All persons liable to service, who do not attach themselves to a mounted company, will be organized in one of the two classes embraced in the annexed order from the Adjutant and Inspector General's Office.

Citizens of South Carolina! You entered this contest resolved to live free or perish. Your brothers, sons and fathers of the army and State Reserves are already in the field. Place yourselves by their sides and make good your determination, that no foul minion of the despot Lincoln should ever place, with impunity, his unhallowed footprint on the soil of your State. You have never wronged your foes. Make them rue the day they attempted to efface you from your heritage and give it to others. The ray of hope which some sanguine persons supposed they saw in the Chicago Convention has gone out in darkness. Be not deceived. There is no prospect of peace from that quarter. Peace is to be obtained alone, under the blessing of God, through your fortitude, your sacrifices and your own strong arms. Given under my hand and the seal of the State at Columbia, this 5th day of September, Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

GENERAL ORDERS NO. 10.

ALL PERSONS LIABLE TO ACTUAL SERVICE within and without their Districts in times of invasion and insurrection will assemble on SATURDAY, the 10th of September, instant, at their usual regimental parades, and the senior officer in the regiment will take command, and will enroll every man in the regiment liable to service as above. On MONDAY, the 12th instant, those of the different regiments, liable to actual service beyond their districts, supplied with at least four (4) days rations, will proceed by the shortest and most expeditious route for the purpose of completing the organization of the troops for active service in the field to the following places of rendezvous, to wit:

The First Brigade, composed of the 1st, 2d, 3d, 4th, 5th and 42d Regiments, to Belton, in Anderson District, for organization, under Lt. Col. J. W. Harrison, A. D. C.

The Second Brigade, composed of the 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th Regiments, to Ninety-six Depot, under Lt. Col. William P. Butler, A. D. C.

The Third Brigade, composed of the 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th, 15th and 43d Regiments, to Branchville, under Lt. Col. A. P. Aldrich, A. D. C.

The Fourth Brigade, composed of the 16th, 17th, 18th and 19th Regiments, to Charleston, under Lt. Col. Wm. G. DeSaussure, A. D. C.

The Fifth Brigade, composed of the 20th, 21st, 22d, 23d and 44th Regiments, to Camden, under Lt. Col. A. H. Boykin, A. D. C.

The Sixth Brigade, composed of the 24th, 25th, 26th and 27th Regiments, to Winnsboro, under Lt. Col. F. Hampton, A. D. C.

The Seventh and Eighth Brigades will be organized under subsequent orders.

The Ninth Brigade, composed of the 34th, 35th, 36th, 37th and 46th Regiments, to Union O. H., under Lt. Col. R. G. McCaw, A. D. C.

The Tenth Brigade, composed of the 38th, 39th, 40th, 41st and 45th Regiments, to Newberry O. H., under Lt. Col. W. D. Simpson, A. D. C.

All company officers will assemble at their usual regimental parades with accurate lists of the men in their respective beats liable to actual service as above, and will report all absentees to the commanders of their respective regiments when they meet at their brigadier rendezvous.

The persons liable under this call for actual service beyond their district are those between 16 and 17 years of age, resident aliens, exempts from Confederate service between 17 and 50 years of age during the continuance of such exemption, and persons who have been enrolled for Confederate service and detailed to remain at home in civil employments or pursuits, during the continuance of such detail, unless such detailed person shall be serving in some Confederate military organization.

Those exempted under the existing State laws from actual service out of their respective districts, are earnestly urged to unite with this organization for the defence of the State. All who do not so unite will be organized by the commanding officers of regiments on Saturday, the 10th inst., for actual service in their respective districts, into companies of not less than sixty-four, (where practicable,) including commissioned and non-commissioned officers and privates.

Officers will issue transportation tickets for all who travel by railroad, which tickets will be recognized by this Department.

The Aids-de-Camp charged with the organization of the foregoing troops will call to their aid an assistant and a competent surgeon to decide upon cases of physical disability.

The Officers and Cadets of the Arsenal Citadel Academies will hold themselves in readiness for active service in the field on short notice.

The Aids-de-Camp of the Governor Militia Officers are charged with the prompt and execution of this order.
