## War Taxes of 1864.

ASSESSORS OFFICE,  
CAMDEN, Sept. 15th, 1864.

THE ASSESSORS OF THE 17th COLLECTION  
District hereby give notice that they are now  
prepared to receive the RETURNS for the TAXES  
of 1864.

In order to aid tax-payers in preparing their returns,  
the following schedule and classification of taxable ar-  
ticles is published:

### CLASS I—All Property Engaged in Agriculture.

The kinds of property which shall be considered as  
employed in agriculture are: All lands actually cul-  
tivated, or connected with or contributing to such cul-  
tivation, such as wood or pasture lands; all slaves,  
little, big, old and young, above twelve years of age,  
as are properly known and designated as plantation  
or farm negroes, as contradistinguished from mechanics  
or house servants or others not connected with a farm  
or plantation; all horses, mules and oxen used as  
work animals on a farm or plantation, as contra-  
distinguished from family horses or horses of pleasure,  
and from horses, mules or stock cattle upon such es-  
tate but not actually used in tilling the soil; all ploughs,  
carts, wagons and implements of husbandry generally  
used and necessary to the proper cultivation of the  
crops.

### CLASS II—All Property of every kind, Real, Per- sonal and Mixed, not employed in Agriculture.

This property will embrace lands not employed in  
agriculture; all real estate in cities, towns and vil-  
lages, and all other real estate throughout the country  
that does not contribute to the tax in kind; all slaves  
not employed in agriculture, embracing all house ser-  
vants, both in the city and country, carpenters, handi-  
craftsmen of all kinds, draymen, day laborers, body  
servants, coachmen, &c., and all others not agricultural  
including slaves on farms under twelve years of age;  
cows, mules and jennets not engaged in agriculture;  
attle of the bovine species, sheep, goats and swine.

Cotton, wool, tobacco, corn, wheat, rye, oats, buck-  
wheat and all kinds of grain; potatoes and all kinds  
of peas, and all products of the farm, garden or or-  
chard.

Flour, meal, sugar, molasses, bacon, lard and all  
other groceries, merchandise, spirituous liquors, wine,  
cider, &c.

Value of household and kitchen furniture, agricul-  
tural tools and implements, owned but not employed  
in agriculture, and all tools of mechanics or others,  
musical instruments and all articles of domestic use,  
carriages, wagons, drays, carts and every species of  
vehicles on wheels not employed in agriculture; books,  
maps, pictures, paintings, statuary and other works of  
art.

The assets of all banks or other joint stock com-  
panies, whether incorporated or not, are taxed just as in-  
dividuals are taxed—banks paying a tax on their cap-  
ital and reserved funds, and returning their gold and  
silver coin as others are required to do.

Gold and silver ware and plate, jewels, jewelry and  
watches; gold and silver coin, gold dust, gold or sil-  
ver bullion; value of moneys held abroad, bills of ex-  
change on foreign countries, promissory notes, rights,  
credits and securities, including Confederate bonds; all  
solvent credits, bank bills and all other paper issued  
as currency—except non-interest bearing Confederate  
Treasury notes—and not employed in a registered  
business.

On all profits made by buying and selling articles—  
purchased since the 1st January, 1863—between the  
17th February and 1st July, 1864, a tax of 30 per  
cent.

There is also a tax of 1 per cent. on all property due  
and payable in 1864, under the Act to raise money to  
increase the pay of soldiers.

Tax-payers are urged, as there has been necessarily  
some delay, to be prompt in making their returns  
as above enumerated. Office hours from 9 o'clock a.

## Slave Labor for the Coast,

DIVISION NO. 2.

I. COMMISSIONERS OF ROADS AND THE  
town authorities within the Judicial Districts of  
Lancaster, Kershaw, Chesterfield, Darlington, Marl-  
boro, Marion, Sumter, Clarendon, Williamsburg, and  
Horry, will forthwith summon all slaveholders within  
their respective limits to deliver ONE-HALF of their  
slaves, liable to road duty, at the Railroad depots near-  
est their residence, on TUESDAY THE 27TH DAY  
OF SEPTEMBER NEXT, at 8 o'clock a. m. there to  
await transportation to Charleston, for thirty days  
labor on the fortifications.

II. The Confederate authorities have made a requisition upon the State for Two Thousand laborers monthly. The proportion of one-fourth heretofore called for, had failed to supply half of this number. In view of this fact and the great urgency of the demand for labor at this time, it is deemed expedient to shorten the interval between the calls, and increase the quota. This is no violation of the law, for it does not fix the quota of labor, nor the interval between the calls, but prescribes that such proportion shall be called for as will fill the requisition, giving thirty days notice. Each Division in the order fixed will be required to furnish this quota, and no injustice will be done to any.

III. All parties, whether individuals or companies, who own or employ more than one road hand, are required to furnish their quota, (one-half) unless relieved by detail from Department Headquarters. This can relieve only those hands permanently engaged on the specific work for which the detail was granted. Commissioners of roads will give their attention to this matter and report to this office.

IV. Great confusion exists from the imperfect manner in which the names of owners are given to agents at the several depots. It is the duty of one, or more of the Commissioners, to be present to verify the quota of each owner, and prepare correct lists.

Within five days after delivery on this call they will please forward to this office names of defaulters in their respective divisions of roads.
