In order to aid tax-payers in preparing their feturns, the following schedule and classification of taxable articles is published:

CLASS I-All Property Engaged in Agriculture. The kinds of property which shall be considered as employed in sgriculture are: All lands actually cul-tivated or connected with or contributing to such cul-tivation, such as wood or pasture lands; all slaves, little, big, old and young above twelve years of age, as are properly known and designated as plantation or farm negroes, as contradistinguished from mechanics or house servants or others not connected with a farm or plantation; all ho ses, mules and oxen used as work animals on a farm or plantation, as contra-distinguished from family horses or horses of pleasure, and from borses, mules or stock cattle upon such estate but not actually used in tilling the soil; all ploughs carts, wagons and implements of hu-bandry generally used and necessary to the proper cuitivation of the

CLASS II-All Property of every kind, Real, Per sonat and Mixed, not employed in Agriculture.

This property will embrace lands not employed in agriculture; all real estate in cities, towns and villages, and all other real estate throughout the country that does not contribute to the tax in kind; all slaves not employed in agriculture, embracing all house servants, both in the city and country, carpenters, handi-craftsmen of all kinds, draymen, day laborers, body servants, coachmen! &c., and all others not agricultural h cluding slaves on farms under twelve years of age corses, mules and jennies not engaged in agriculture attle of the bovine species, sheep, gonts and swine. The assets of all banks or other joint stock companies, whether incorporated or not, are taxed just as individuals are taxed-banks paying a tax on their cap ital and reserved funds, and returning their gold and silver coin as others are required to do

Gold and silver ware and plate, jewels, jewelry and watches; gold and silver coin, gold dust, gold or silver bullion; vatue of moneys held abroad, bills of exchange on foreign countries, promissory notes, rights, credits and securities, including Confederate bonds; all solvent credits, bank bills and all other paper, issued as currency-except non-interest bearing *Confederate Treasury notes-and not employed in a registered business

On all profits made by buying and selling articles purchased since the 1st January. 1863—between the 17th February and 1st July, 1864, a tax of 30 per

There is also a tax of 1 per cent. on all property due and payable in 1864, under the Act to raise money to increase the pay of soldiers.

GENERAL ORDERS NO. 22.

PERSONS LIABLE BY THE LAWS OF THIS State to actual military service beyond the limits of their Districts, and who have not been enrolled and and induced in companies organized in pursuance of General Orders Nos. 10 and 11, issued from this office, are required to report for enrollment and assignment on or before the 5th day of October next, or they will be held liable to arrest and to the penalties provided for by the 11th section of the Act of the General Assembly, ratified the 6th day of February, 1863, entitled "An Act for the better organization of the militia,

and for other purposes."

II. Persons required to report by the preceding par agraph of these orders, where companies have alrebeen organized in the mil tia regiment to which they belong, will be allowed to select their companies, provided they are not already full, and will report . to the officers commanding such companies, who will enroll their names.

"III. Where the companies organized in any regi-ment under General Orders Nos. 10 and 11 all have maximum number, (100 men,) persons required to report by these orders, will report to the commanding companies, if their numbers be sufficient, and make a return thereof to this office; any if their numbers be insufficient to constitute a company, he will return a list of their names to this office, when they will be assigned to companies organized in other regiments.

IV. The commanding officers of companies organ ized in pursuance of General Orders Nos. 10 and 12 and of companies to be organized in the 7th and 8th Brigades, under Special Orders No. 12, are authorized to enroll for service in their respective companies, the persons required by these orders to report for enrollment who reside within their militia regiments, until

their companies reach the maximum number.

V. It is made the duty of all the militia officers of the State to report to the proper officer for enrollment the names of persons who are liable to enrollment under these orders.

VI. Persons enrolled under General Orders Nos. 10 and 11, under Special Orders No. 12 and nuder these orders, will be allowed to volunteer in companies of mounted infantry; but they will, nevertheless, be enrolled as required by said orders, and held liable to service as in antry until their companies have been accepted at this office as mounted infantry.
