## GENERAL ORDERS NO. 15.

THE COMPANIES ORGANIZED IN every Militia Regiment of this State will forthwith proceed to Hamburg, S. C., and report for duty to Lieut. Col. Wilmot G. De Saussure, A. D. C.

The commanding officers of said companies will immediately summon the members of their respective companies, as well as all persons within the Militia Regiments to which they belong, and who have not been enrolled, but who are liable to duty beyond the limits of their Districts, to assemble at the most convenient points on the line of railroads, prepared to proceed at once to Hamburg.

The troops will provide themselves with haversacks and four days' rations, and such supplies of clothing and cooking utensils as are indispensable for their comfort in the field, without encumbering themselves with such articles as are not absolutely necessary.

Company officers are authorized to issue certificates for the transportation of members of their respective commands.

The persons liable to this service are all persons between the ages of sixteen and seventeen years, and all persons between seventeen and fifty years of age, who are exempt from Confederate service, but who are not exempt by the laws of this State from State service, which includes, amongst other classes, all bonded agriculturists who have been exempted by Confederate authority as owners and managers of their own plantations.

Companies convenient to Hamburg will select their own means of transportation to that point.

The commanding officers of Regiments, and all general officers, as well as the officers commanding these companies, are charged with the immediate extension of these orders without further notice.

The "Battalion of State Cadets" and the companies of Mounted Infantry, commanded by Captains Frederick and Percival, will hold themselves in readiness to take the field at the shortest notice.

The Governor and Commander-in-chief enjoins, as a matter of the utmost importance for the public defence, the prompt execution of these orders, and the assembling of the troops at the places designated without delay.

## GENERAL ORDER NO. 7.

I. PURSUANT TO GENERAL ORDER NO. 73. Adjutant and Inspector General's Office, current series, (hereto appended) the Brigadier General commanding the Reserve Forces of South Carolina hereby assumes control and direction of the conscription service in the State.

II. Except as hereinafter specified, the organization of the Conscription Department in the State including the Examining Boards, will be preserved; and all existing orders, regulations and instructions of the Commandant of Conscripts will be continued of force until otherwise ordered.

III. Local Enrolling Officers and Examining Boards will report immediately to the Commandant of Conscripts, and through him communicate with these Headquarters, and will, through him, receive orders and instructions.

IV. All communications in relation to the Conscription service in the State, and all applications for exemption and detail must be made through the Commandant of Conscripts; communications on all other subjects will continue to be made through the A. A. General of the Reserve Forces, S. C.

V. The office of Conscription District Enrolling Officer being abolished, all officers heretofore acting in that capacity will report by letter to the Commandant of Conscripts for a signment to other duty; setting forth their rank, corps, position and present assignment to duty. Competent officers will be assigned as Inspectors of Conscription, in the several Congressional Districts.

VI. With a view to compliance of Par. III of said General Order No. 73, the Commandant of Conscripts will, without delay, order the medical examination of all commissioned officers and other persons (except those of the "Invalid Corps") employed in the enrolling service of this State. Commissioned officers, as to whom no disability is found to exist, will hold themselves in readiness to be assigned to duty in the field as soon as practicable.

VII. Application for assignment to duty as Enrolling Officers, Assistants, Clerks, and to other positions in the conscription service in this State, will be received from officers, non-commissioned officers and privates belonging to the Reserve Forces, and from retired and light duty officers and men, and from persons not liable to service in the field. Such applications, enclosing testimonials of character, intelligence and fitness, will be addressed to Maj. C. D. MONTON, Commandant of Conscripts, Columbia, S. C.

PERSONS WISHING TO CONTRACT FOR THE PRINTING for the two Houses of the Legislature of South Carolina, or of either of them, will submit their proposals to the undersigned, at Columbia, on or before 28th of November inst.

The following, as near as can be ascertained, will be the character and quantity of the work:  
Bills, in Pica, 62 lines, of 35 ems—2,170 ems per page.

Reports and Documents, Long Primer, 55 lines, of 31 ems each—1,705 ems per page.

Permanent Journal, Long Primer, 55 lines, of 31 ems each—1,705 ems per page.

Calendars of the two Houses, Long Primer, 55 lines; of 31 ems each—1,705 ems per page.

The Bills to be printed on good writing paper, and all other printing to be done on printing paper, of as fine quality as can be procured.

Extra copies of every paper ordered to be printed by either House, must be furnished to each member of the other branch of the Legislature.

Of the Bills, Reports, Documents, Journal and Calendar, two hundred copies are required daily, one hundred and fifty for the members of the House of Representatives, and fifty for the members of the Senate.

The Journal and Calendar must be delivered punctually at or before the hour of meeting of the Houses of each day, and one copy by the same hour, to be delivered at the Executive Department, and one copy to the State Auditor.

The Acts and Permanent Forms of the Houses must be printed, stitched and ready for delivery by the 20th of February, after the regular session. Rule and figure work to count, double, and pages and side notes to be estimated at the rate of 1,705 ems per page.

The two Houses will separately choose the Printer of their daily work, and will unite in the selection of the Printer of their permanent work, viz: Acts, Reports, Resolutions, &c.

Proposals for the Printing of the two Houses, or of either House, must conform to the foregoing specifications.

## THE LAWS OF NEWSPAPERS.

1. SUBSCRIBERS WHO DO NOT GIVE EXPRESS notice to the contrary, are considered as wishing to continue their subscription.
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrearages are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the offices to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled the bills and ordered them discontinued.
4. If subscribers remove to other places without informing the publishers, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction they are held responsible, for the same.
5. The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from the office or moving and leaving them uncalled for is "prima facies" evidence of intentional fraud.
6. The Courts have also repeatedly decided that a postmaster who neglects to perform his duty of giving reasonable notice, as required by the Post Office Department, of the neglect of a person to take from the office newspapers addressed to him, renders the Postmasters liable to the publishers for the subscription price.
