

THE LAWS OF NEWSPAPARS.

1. SUBSCRIBERS WHO DO NOT GIVE EX. PRESS notice to the contrary, are considered as wishing to continue their subscription.

2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrearages are paid.

3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the offices to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled the bills

and ordered them discontinued. 4. If subscribers remove to other places without informing the publishers, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction they are held responsible, for

5. The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from the office or moving and leaving them uncalled for is "prima facis" evidence of intentional

fraud.
6. The Courts have also repeatedly decided, that a postmaster who neglects to perform his duty of giving reasonable notice, as required by the Post Office Department, of the neglect of a person to take from the office newspapers addressed to him, renders the Postmasters liable to the publishers for the subscription
