Our Mobile exchanges announce the death of Col JAMES S. LEAS, an old resident, and formerly well known in this his native State.

The Chairman of one of the Committees on Foreign Affairs in LINCOLN'S Congress has, since the news of the capture of the Florida in a Brazilian port, warmly defended the act, and declared his readiness to sustain it in Congress.

SUICIDE—Mr. W. B. TINSLEY, well known for some years as the Cashier of the Bank of Savannah, on Tuesday last at Mill-edgeville, walked out into the graveyard and put an end to his life by shooting himself—We do not know the cause of this sad tragedy.

Mr. S. EWART, LINCOLN'S Assistant Treasurer at New York, has been to Washington, trying to concert a scheme with FESSENDEN to bring down the price of gold. He was instructed to offer to purchase gold for strictly commercial necessities, gold for one hundred and fifty, but none to be sold for speculative purposes.

THE FLORIDA—The career of the Confederate war steamer Florida has been an eventful one, of which the country may well be proud. She sailed from Liverpool on the 22d of March, 1862, under the name of Orato, and arrived at Nassau, N. P., in April, where she received her armament, etc. On the 14th of June, 1862, she was seized by the British steamer Greyhound, but was soon released. On the 9th of August, 1862, she left Nassau, and proceeded to Green Bay, where she was fitted out for a cruise, her stores, etc, being brought to her by the English schooner Prince Alfred. She ran into Mobile on the 4th of September, 1862, and was struck by shot several times from the guns of the Wiona and Oneida, and ran out on the 17th of January, 1863. After doing much damage to Federal shipping, she went into St. George's Channel in August, 1863. In September, she entered the French port of Brest, and on the 11th of that month was detained by the French Government. Soon after she captured the steamer Electric Spark, bound from New York to New Orleans. For a time she was a consort of the Alabama, and acted in conjunction with her in cruising. She was commanded for a long time by Lieut. J. N. MAFER, but for the past year or more she has been commanded by C. MANGAULT MORRIS, formerly of the United States navy.

THE BONHAM GUARDS—The "Bonham Guards," a company of youthful recruits, under Capt. A. D. Goodwyn, appeared on the streets yesterday, marching with the precision of trained troops. Our friend, the Captain, true to his past history, and the instincts of patriotism, although still disabled from the effects of a wound received while acting gallantly as the Lieut. Col. of the 2d regiment, has gathered these spirited young men around him and is off to-day for the Georgia border. Success attend them! May they have a share in the discomfiture of Sherman and return without loss or wounds!—Guardian of Wednesday.

LATEST BY TELEGRAPH

REPORTS OF THE PRESS ASSOCIATION.

Entered according to the Act of Congress in the year 1863, by J. S. THRASHER, in the Clerk's office of the District Court of the Confederate States for the Northern District of Georgia.

NEW MARKET, November 22—Two divisions of the enemy's cavalry came two miles this side of Jackson this morning. We attacked and drove them back a distance of ten or eleven miles. Our loss seven or eight killed and wounded. The enemy's loss not known.

HEADQUARTERS, November 22—Hon. J. A. Seddon, Secretary of War: "Gen. Early reports that the enemy's cavalry, in considerable force, drove in our cavalry pickets this morning and advanced to Mount Jackson and crossed the river. It was met by some infantry and one brigade of cavalry, and driven back. Rosser pursued, driving the enemy beyond Edenburg in confusion, and compelled him to abandon his killed and wounded. Early thinks it was a reconnaissance."

RICHMOND, November 23—The Washington Chronicle of the 20th has been received. It contains nothing of interest except an admission of their defeat in East Tennessee and a proclamation of Lincoln, raising the blockade at Norfolk, Fernandina and Pensacola. Gold closed on Saturday at 220. New York papers of the 21st has been received. A telegram from Buffalo announces the arrival there of Gen. Birney, Gen. Sherman's chief artillery officer. He left Kingston on the morning of the 12th, and said the men had received eight month's pay and an outfit adapted to a hard and rapid winter campaign. Both entire army, including Forrest's cavalry, were at Tallahassee and Florence, being watched by Gen. Thomas. The invasion of Tennessee was deemed impossible.

A Cincinnati telegram says 900 rebel prisoners arrived in Nashville on Saturday from Atlanta. Believing the place evacuated, they rushed in for plunder and were captured. The Cincinnati Gazette of Friday says: Sherman is advancing towards the Savannah river in two columns. One would go to Augusta and the other to Macon. It gives Beaufort as the ultimate destination, when he intends to make the south Atlantic blockading squadron, his future base of supplies. Only such buildings as Atlanta as could be useful to the rebels were burnt. The extensive rolling mills and large store houses at Rome, were burnt by order of Gen. Cole. The Etowah Hotel was also burnt. Advices from New Orleans of the 12th stated the French troops had evacuated Matamoros. At Brownsville there is a small force. Gen. Canby's wounds are severe—he will not be able to take the saddle for six months. Everything was put at Little Rock on the 9th inst. A Chattanooga telegram of the 19th says the rebels attacked our forces at Strawberry Plains, and were repulsed every time.
