NEW GOODS FURSUANT TO GENERAL ORDER NO 73 I. PURSUANT TO GENERAL UNDER AND A Ajutant and Inspector General's office, current series, (horeunto appended) the Brigadier Goneral commanding Reserve forces of South Carolina heroby relation control and direction of the conscription service in the State.

II. Except as hereinafter specified, the organization of the Conscription L'epartment in the State, including the Examining Boards, will be preserved; and all ex-isting orders, regulations and instructions of the Commandant of Conscripts will be continued of force until otherwise ordered. 111. Local Enrolling Officers and Examining Boards

will report immediately to the Commandant of Con-scripts, and through him communicate with these Headquarters, and will, through him, receive orders and instructions. IV All communications in relation to the Conscrip-

tion service in the State, and all applications for ex-emption and detail must be made through the Commandant of Conscripts; communications on all other

subjects will continue to be made through the  $\Lambda$ . A. General of the reserve Forces, S.G. V. The office of long essional District Enrolling Officer being abolished, all officers heretofore acting in that capacity will report by letter to the Commandant of Conscripts for a signment to other duty, setting forth their rank, corps, position and present assignment to duty. Competent officers will be assigned as "Iuspectors of Conscription," in the several Congressional Districts.

YI: With a view to compliance of Par. III of said General Order No. 73, the Commandant of Conscripts will, without delay, order the medical examination of all commissioned officers and other persons (except those of the "Invalid Corps") employed in the enroll-ing service of this State. Commissioned officers, as to whom no disability is found to exist, will hold themselves in condiness to be assigned to duty in the field as soon as practicable. VII. Application for assignment to duty as Enroll-

ing Officers, Assistants, Clerks, and to other positions in the Conscrip ion service in this State; will be received from officers, non-commissioned officers and privates belonging to the Reserve Forces, and from retired and light duty officers and men, and from per-sons not liable to service in the field. Such appheations, enclosing to stimonials of character, intelligence and timess, will be addressed to Maj. C. D. MFLTON, Commandant of Conscripts, Columbia S. C.




