GENERAL ORDERS NO. 17.

PARAGRAPH V. OF GENERAL ORDERS No. 15, current series from this office, is hereby repeated, to wit: "The persons liable to this service (service beyond their Districts) are all persons between the ages of sixteen and seventeen years, and all persons between seventeen and fifty years of age who are exempt from Confederate service, but who are not exempt by the laws of this State from State service, which includes, amongst other classes, all bonded agriculturists who have been exempted by Confederate authority as owners and managers of their own plantations."

II. This includes persons who have been exempted from Confederate service by reason of physical disability, but who have not been exempted by State Surgeons.

III. Paragraph III. of General Orders No. 14, current series from this office, is hereby reiterated, to wit: "Persons who are liable to service in said companies, and who have failed to report their names, when the companies shall be ordered into service will be arrested, carried into camp and tried by Courts Martial, in pursuance of Act of the General Assembly."

IV. All such persons as are included in the preceding paragraph of these Orders will forthwith report for duty at Hamburg, S. C., without any summons or notice from the commanding officers, or they will be arrested.

V. In the following Regiments no returns of organized companies have been made to this office, and the persons in said Regiments who are liable to service beyond the limits of their Districts will forthwith report for duty at Hamburg, S. C., to be assigned to other companies on pain of being arrested and sent forward to wit:

Printing for the Legislature.

PERSONS WISHING TO CONTRACT FOR THE PRINTING for the two Houses of the Legislature of South Carolina, or of either of them, will submit their proposals to the undersigned, at Columbia, on or before 28th of November inst.

The following, as near as can be ascertained, will be the character and quantity of the work:

- Bills, in Pica, 62 lines, of 35 ems—2,176 ems per page.
- Reports and Documents, Long Primer, 55 lines, of 31 ems each—1,705 ems per page.
- Permanent Journal, Long Primer, 65 lines, of 31 ems each—1,705 ems per page.
- Calendars of the two Houses, Long Primer, 55 lines, of 31 ems each—1,705 ems per page.

The Bills to be printed on good writing paper, and all other printing to be done on printing paper, of a fine quality as can be procured.

Extra copies of every paper ordered to be printed by either House, must be furnished to each member of the other branch of the Legislature.

Of the Bills, Reports, Documents, Journal and Calendar, two hundred copies are required daily, one hundred and fifty for the members of the House of Representatives, and fifty for the members of the Senate.

The Journal and Calendar must be delivered punctually at or before the hour of meeting of the Houses of each day, and one copy by the same hour, to be delivered at the Executive Department, and one copy to the State Auditor.

The Acts and Permanent Forms of the Houses must be printed, stitched and ready for delivery by the 20th of February, after the regular session. Rule and figure work to count double, and pages and side notes to be estimated at the rate of 1,705 ems per page.

The two Houses will separately choose the Printer of their daily work, and will unite in the selection of the Printer of their permanent work, viz: Acts, Reports, Resolutions, &c.

Proposals for the Printing of the two Houses, or of either House, must conform to the foregoing specifications.

THE LAWS OF NEWSPAPERS.

1. SUBSCRIBERS WHO DO NOT GIVE EXPRESS notice to the contrary, are considered as wishing to continue their subscription.
2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrearages are paid.
3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the offices to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled the bills and ordered them discontinued.
4. If subscribers remove to other places without informing the publishers, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction they are held responsible, for the same.
5. The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from the office of moving and leaving them uncollected for is "prima facie" evidence of intentional fraud.
6. The Courts have also repeatedly decided that a postmaster who neglects to perform his duty of giving reasonable notice, as required by the Post Office Department, of the neglect of a person to take from the office newspapers addressed to him, renders the Postmaster liable to the publisher for the subscription price.
