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

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



THE LAWS OF NEWSPAPARS.

SUBSCRIBERS WHO DO NOT GIVE EX-PRESS notice to the contrary, are considered as wish-2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of thetr

nowspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrearages are paid. 3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their nows-

papers from the offices to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled the bills and ordered them discontinued.

4. If subscribers, remove to other places without in-forming the publishers, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction they are held responsible, for the same.

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5. The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from the office or moving and leaving them uncalled for is "prima facis" evidence of intentional fraud.

6.
