1. SUBSCRIBERS WHO DO NOT GIVE BX-PRESS notice to the contrary, are considered as with-

ing to continue their subscription. 2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them

until all arrearages are paid. 3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their news-papers from the offices to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled the bills and ordered them discontinued:

4. If subscribers remove to other places without in-forming the publishers, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction they are held responsible, for the same.

5. The Courts have decided that refusing to the newspapers from the office or moving and leaving them uncalled for is "prima facis" evidence of intentional fraud.

6. The Courts have also repetically decided that a postmaster who neglects to perform his duty of giving reasonable notice, as required by the Post Office Department, of the neglect of a person to take from the office newspapers addressed to him, renders the Post-masters liable to the publishers for the subset period
