II. Paragraph I of General Orders No. 16, current series, from this office, requiring all persons claiming exemption from militia service on the ground of physical disability, to appear before the Examining Board at Columbia or the Surgeon-General at Hamburg; S: C, is so far modified that persons who have been re-tently examined by the Boards of Confederate Surgeons and exempted from Cofffederate service on the ground of permanent disability, will not be fequired to appear before the Board at Columbia or the Surgeon-General, but will transmit copies of their certificates, through the commanding officers of companies formed in their regiments, to the Surgeon-General of the State—and in regiments where no companies have been organized. directly to the Surgeon-General-the copies of said certificate to be certified by a magistrate or a magis trate ex effici). COLUMBIA, S. C, December 7, 1864. THE ACCOMPANYING ACT, RATIFIED RIM the General Assembly, on the 6th instant, is published for the information of the militia of the State. By order of the Governor.

AN ACT TO ALTER AND AMEND THE MILITIA LAWS OF THE STATE.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, now met and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same, That from and after the passage of this Act, all free male white persons within this State, between the ages of sixteen and lifty, not exempt from active service without the limits of the District in which they registe by the initial limits of the District in which they reside, by the inilitia laws of this State, shall be hable to active military duty without the limits of the tate at the call of his

Excellency the Governor,
SEC. 2. That the Governor shall have authority,
whenever in his judgment it is necessary for the defence of this State or of the adjacent States, to order out of the limits of the State such portion of those linout of the limits of the State such portion of those lin-ble to active military only, and for such a length of time as m his judgment the exigency may require— Anothat in addition to the other penalties prescribed by law for defaulters, the Governor shall be authorized to order the arrest of all such as may be made to military duty under this Act, to the intent that they may be compelled to perform the duty devolving upon them; Provided, no esheless, That he shall at no time place such militance, and his control, so as not to be able to recall them at any moment whenever the ne-

cessities of the State require it.

Sec. 3. That all free male white persons within the State, between the ages of sixteen and sixty, not embraced in the active militia, shall be liable to military duty in cases of alarm, invasion, insurrection or as the posse c milatus in where within the limits of the

Sec. 4. That the Governor shall have power to allow an exemption or detail in such special cases, either of necessity or of public interest, as in his judgment should be-made in either or both of the said classes of mili


SEC. 5 That all Acis or clauses of Acts inconsistent, with this Act be repealed

PRESS notice to the contrary, are considered as wishing to continue their subscription.

2. If subscribers order the discontinuance of their

newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrearages are paid.

3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the offices to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled the bill and ordered them discontinued.

4. If subscribers remove to other places without informing the publishers, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction they are held responsible, for
