





The two liouses will separately choose the Printer of their daily work, and will unite in the selection of the Printer of their permanent work, viz: Acts, Reports, Resolutions, kc. THE LAWS OF NEWSPAPARS.

1. SUBSCRIBERS WHO DO NOT GIVE EX-PRESS notice to the contrary, are cousidered as wish-

 If subscribers order the 'discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrearages are paid.

5. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the offices to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled the bills and ordered them discontinued.

 If subscribers remove to other places without in-forming the publishers, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction they are held responsible, for the same.

5. The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from the office or moving and leaving them uncalled for is "prima facis" evidence of intentional

fraud. 6. The Courts have also repeatedly decided that a postmaster who neglects to perform his duty of giving reasonable notice, as required by the Post Office Department, of the neglect of a person to take from the office newspapers addressed to him, renders the Port masters liable to the publishers for the subscription price.
