**WASHINGTON'S GRAVE.**—A gentleman who has recently visited the grave of Washington at Mount Vernon, says:—

**INTREPID JEWS.**—On a late occasion the Emperor of Russia was reviewing his fleet, when two sailors particularly excited his attention, both by the precision with which they performed several difficult manœuvres, and by the agility and daring which they displayed. The Emperor was so much pleased that he immediately promoted one to be a captain; the other he appointed lieutenant on the spot.
