INSANITY.—Mr. Chandler of the U. S. Gazette, writing from the East, gives the following account of some of the inmates of the Augusta, (Me.) State Lunatic Asylum:

One beautiful young woman arrested my attention. In another ward I found a different class of patients. Moping, melancholy and blank (not howling) despair were congregated there. A female beckoned to me from a distance, and I went to hold a conversation with her.

I shall go to hell, said she, and you will go with me.
