

four hundred) lashes. His cries were hushed by drawing the rope tightly around his neck, his toes touching the ground. He bore it nobly, and told them to kill him, but that he would never acknowledge himself a thief. He was proved innocent by an alibi, and the money paid to him the second day after. Great excitement prevails. The guilty parties are highly respectable, and can well afford to pay the high cost which their act of lynching will cost them."

IMPORTANT DISCOVERY.—*Reproduction of the Potato.*—The Newark Advertiser says that the Rev. N. S. Smith, of the city of New York, has discovered a method of raising potatoes from the seeds of the ball of the plant. About four years ago he planted the seed of an ordinary plant, and obtained potatoes about the size of a pea. These he planted the next year, with the seed from their plants, and both yielded potatoes of an increased size. Again, the third year, he planted the second year's potatoes and their seed, and had the pleasure of gathering potatoes large enough for the table, of the finest flavor and texture; and entirely free from the rot, although planted alongside of those having the disease. He finds that the potato raised from the seeds, instead of the roots, is as hard and good in the spring as when dug from the drill.

THE TEA PLANT IN FRANCE.—The Journal des Debats states that the experiments made for introducing the culture of the tea plant in France had fully succeeded. The tea plant has been found to thrive as well in Angers as at Hyeres, under the warmest climate of Provence; which is considered a fact without example in the history of this plant since its introduction in Europe, and demonstrates that the climate of France is favorable to the culture of the tea plant. The experiments made in Algeria have not been so successful; all the plants were killed by the heat, notwithstanding every precaution. Between the province in the north of France, of which the climate appear too cold and humid, and the burning plains of Algeria, there may be selected the Provinces of the South, where, by choosing good soils and favorable sites, there could be no doubt but the tea plant might be cultivated with success.
