

REPORTED BATTLE AT NAUVOO.—By the steamer Ocean Wave, which arrived here yesterday, we learn that a messenger arrived at Warsaw about 11 o'clock on Friday evening, a few minutes before she left, who stated that a battle had taken place about 3 o'clock that afternoon near Nauvoo, which lasted two hours, and in which from twelve to fifteen men were killed and wounded. The particulars, so far as they could be ascertained, are, that on Friday the Nauvooites, hearing that the anti-Mormons were on the march to their city, marched out to the number of from three to five hundred, and posted themselves at the distance of about one mile east of the temple, having an open plain in front, and an extensive corn field in the rear, their line being formed near and parallel with the fence. Here they waited the approach of the Anties, who arrived about 3 o'clock in the afternoon. said to be eight hundred in number, with five or six pieces of cannon. The latter were posted on an eminence, and opened their fire on the Mormons, but at too great a distance to be effective. Soon after, the action was continued with small arms, and lasted until 5 o'clock, when the Anties either retreated or withdrew. Their loss is stated to be from eight fifteen to killed, but that is uncertain, and the Nauvooites had one man killed and two wounded: the latter had no cannon. It was expected that the battle would be resumed the same evening or on the following morning

AIKEN, Esq., Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the State of South Carolina: Whereas, it becomes a People, not only individually, but in their aggregate and collective capacity, to render thanks to the Supreme Ruler of the Universe, for blessings and favors munificently conferred, and to bow themselves in humble resignation for such as in his wisdom he has thought proper to withhold; and, whereas, while a portion of the products of our land, have been partially ravaged and destroyed, there is yet abundant cause for thankfulness, in the prospect of a plentiful supply of the necessities of life, in the continued protection of a Merciful Providence, and in all other blessings derived from Almighty God.

Now, therefore, I, William Aiken, Governor of the State of South Carolina, do by these presents set apart and proclaim the **FIFTH DAY OF NOVEMBER NEXT,** to be observed throughout the State, as a day of Thanksgiving, Humiliation and Prayer, and do invite and exhort all Denominations of Christians, and all other persons of whatever sect or persuasion, to dismiss their secular business, and assemble themselves on that day in their respective Houses of Worship, to offer up their thanks to Almighty God, the great Disposer of events, to supplicate a continuance of his tender mercies, and to engage in other devotional exercises as may be proper and suitable to the occasion.
