Poor-House Election.

A Steward of the Abbeville Poor House will be elected by the Commissioners of the Poor, on Saturday the 21st instant, to serve for one year from the first of January, whose duty it will be, subject to their direction, to act as Superintendent of the Poor House and Overseer of the farm. As Superintendent, he will have the care and management of the paupers; and as Overseer, he will be required to perform all the duties of such an agent, which are so well known as to render mention of them here unnecessary. The time and labor of the Steward and family, if he has one, is to be devoted entirely to the institution, and he and family will be supplied with such necessaries (except clothing) as are not raised on the farm, inclusive of what may be.

Applicants will address by letter directed to the Commissioners of the Poor, and leave with any member of the Board. The applicant must state the number of his family, give some idea of the services they can perform, as to plowing, spinning, weaving, sewing, &c &c, and the amount per annum for which he offers his and their services.

Applicants are requested to hand in their proposals as early as possible, and on the day of election their personal attendance on the Board may be necessary. For further particulars enquire of
