MR. WILMOT HIMSELF.

On the 27th of September last, the Hon. D. Wilmot delivered a speech in Wellsboro, Pa., in the course of which he defined the Proviso thus:—

"What is the Proviso? What is its effect and object? Although plain in its language and clear in its design, this inquiry becomes necessary, from the convert manner in which it is constantly assailed. The whole southern press and government organs of the north, represent it, as something that affects or interferes with slavery in the States where slavery exists. Even great men, when writing or speaking upon the subject, persist, in talking about the ABOLITION of slavery, and the rights of the States; as if the Proviso proposed the one; or in any respect interfered with the other. It does not propose, either to abolish, restrict, or in any manner to interfere with slavery, in any of the States of this Union. Its sole object is to secure from the unlawful aggression of slavery that territory which is now free."

Mr. Wilmot complains of the manner in which the Proviso is assailed—he sees the mole but cannot see the beam. What does he mean by the "unlawful aggression of slavery?" Is there anything "unlawful" in the institution of slavery under the government of the United States? On the contrary, is it not recognized and protected by the Constitution? Is there any thing in the fundamental law, by which Pennsylvania and South Carolina are both governed, which says that this domestic institution shall not be introduced into new territory of the Union. To assume that there is anything unlawful in slavery under our government as it now exists, is not only to beg the question, but to pervert and falsify the law and the fact.

But Mr. Wilmot cannot see that the Proviso in any way interferes with the rights of the States. The Constitution entitles the citizens of each State to all the privileges and immunities of the citizens in the several States. If the citizens of Pennsylvania may migrate to new territory with his property and institutions, is it in the spirit or according to the letter of this constitutional equality to withhold the same privilege and immunity from a citizen of South Carolina? Are there to be two classes of American citizenship with a broad and odious line of distinction between them? If this were mere matter of sentiment, it would be gross outrage upon the feelings of the people of the South; but it is a matter of principle, of duty and of right. With the institution of domestic slavery, not only the interest, but the very existence of our people is identified. Every blow struck at it is a blow at the vital part of their organization. Property, peace, life—all are bound up in its security from the aggression of others. Well may the people of South say to Mr. Wilmot in the words of the great poet.

"You take my house when you do take the prop
That doth supports my house; you take my life
When you do take the means whereby I live!"

A VOICE FROM THE WEST.—The Hon. Ephraim H. Foster, formerly a Whig member of the U. S. Senate, from Tennessee, and now a candidate for the same place again, thus responds to a committee of his constituents who inquired, among other things, his opinion in relation to the Wilmot Proviso:

"In submitting your third and last interrogatory, I hope you did not doubt the character of my reply. I esteem the "Wilmot Proviso" as an outrage upon the pride, the rights and the feelings of the most patriotic portion of this great republic; and I trust that I shall be ready everywhere and on all occasions, both publicly and privately, to denounce its authors, with all who join in adopting the unjust and obnoxious principle, as either thoughtless or designing enemies to the future existence of our glorious Union."

We have no doubt that the feeling here expressed is the common feeling of every slaveholding State in the Union, and that ere long it will find in every one of them a deep, indignant and commanding utterance.

Poor House Election.

A STEWARD of the Abbeville Poor House will be elected by the Commissioners of the Poor, on Saturday the 27th instant, to serve for one year from the first of January, whose duty it will be, subject to their direction, to act as Superintendent of the Poor House and Overseer of the farm. As Superintendent, he will have the care and management of the paupers; and as Overseer, he will be required to perform all the duties of such an agent, which are so well known as to render mention of them here unnecessary. The time and labor of the Steward and family, if he has one, is to be devoted entirely to the institution, and he and family will be supplied with such necessaries (except clothing) as are not raised on the farm, inclusive of what may be.

Applicants will address by letter directed to the commissioners of the Poor, and leave with any member of the Board. The applicant must state the number of his family, give some idea of the services they can perform, as to plowing, spinning, weaving, sewing, &c. &c., and the amount per annum for which he offers his and their services. Applicants are requested to hand in their proposals as early as possible, and on the day of election their personal attendance on the board may be necessary.

Also, the commissioners will elect on the same day a PHYSICIAN to the inmates of the Poor House for the year 1848. He will be required to furnish his own medicines, and attend when called on. Proposals received as above.
