The election of Judges.

The election of Judges came off to-day (Thursday) J. J. Wright was re-elected to the Supreme bench. W. J. Whipper for the first circuit and P. L. Wiggin, for the second circuit.

The Treasuryship.

The question was settled on Friday last in executive ression of the Squate. The charges and the answer thereto were considered, and by a vote of twenty-one to ten, the Senate refused to confirm the appointment of Mr. N. B. Myers, so that Mr. Geo. Holmes will again take possession of the office.

THE supply bill as passed by the House of Representatives on Saturday 'ast levies for State purposes nine and a half mills, being one third of a mill less than the lowest estimate made by Gov. Chamberlain in his veto message. They have also and big bonanza bills. The little bonanza provides for a levy of thirteen fif teenths of a mill for three years, and the big bonanza which provides for the liquidation of outstanding pay certificates. levies one half a mill for four years. In this county by the supply bill four mills are levied for county purposes, one mill of which is to be devoted exclusively for deficiencies for the fiscal year commencing November 1st. 1873. These levies together with the two mills for past indebtedness prior to November 1st, 1872, will make a total taxation in addition to loca! school and municipal taxes of sixteen and thirteen fifteenths of a mill.

The House in reducing the levy within the estimate made by the Governor have recognized the will of the people, who e epresentatives they are, and to them as well as to the Governor for the manly stand he took in behalf of the interests of the people and low taxation, should be accorded credit for their action. But the work has yet only been half accomplished, and it is within the power of our legislators by a false step in their action on the appropriation bill, to undo the good they have accomplished in the supply bill. The appropriations must be brought within the amount calculated to be raised or the basis of that bill, or the future by increased taxation for deficiencies will be made to pay for the hixney of a light levy this year. Will they have the nerve and will to keep the appropriation within the levy? Judging by the past they will not but by the spirit of the new departure they may, and if the approval of the pec-1.le, the well done of their constituents can have any influence on their actions.

The Senate appears to be anxious, no to increase the levy, but to make some alteration in the distribution of the amounts, and proposes to reduce the levy for public schools, and to reimburse the school fund by the balance from the phos phate royalty. The school fund above all others is looked upon by the public with a jealous eye, and nothing should be done that will reduce its aggregate amount. This State tax of two mills has been found insufficient to properly support the schools, hence the necessity for local taxation. If this proposed reduction is accomplished the balance from the phosphate royalty should have such safeguards thrown around it by legislation in order that the interest of the public schools should in no wise be affected to its detriment.

We read this week the experience of a Georgian in planting Irish potatoes in moss, by which he not only made a large crop but cured the moss so that after a thorough washing and drying it was ready for manufacture into matresses. Mr. James M. Crofut, last spring also tried this plan with success. The Spanish moss is very plentiful on the Island, and the profits on a crop of potatres planted in this way are about one third more than when planted in the ordinary way. Select good ground, and after breaking it up thoroughly make trenches three feet apart filling them with green moss. Put in your sets and cover with a layer of moss, then earth up in the usual way. When matured the potatoes turn out clean as if they had been washed and the moisture in the moss prevents nem being affecte by drouth.






