

LOCAL ITEMS.

Beaufort, S. C., March 23, 1876.

Treasurer Holmes, started for Florida on Wednesday morning. He is somewhat interested in real estate there.

His Honor, of the Beaufort police court, left town for Columbia and Washington last week.

Fifty members of the Chicago Board of Trade were on board the Western excursion to Port Royal.

The town council did not hold their meeting last night there being no quorum in town.

There were shipped over the Port Royal Railroad for the week ending Friday March 17, 154 bales of cotton.

This week has been the coldest of the season. Winter sitting in the lap of Spring, we believe is the correct simile.

The Young Men's Christian Association will hold a prayer meeting in the M. E. church, Beaufort on Monday evening next.

The bill to amend the charter of Port Royal, has been ratified by the Governor. This reduces the limits of the town.

Information is received that the corn, that in consequence of the early season had been planted in the upper portion of the county, has been killed by frost.

Representative S. J. Bamfield of this county, one of the managers of impeachment in Judge Montgomery Moses' case, came home this week. As the Legislature is to adjourn to day he will not return.

The following were elected delegates to the approaching county Convention, from Hilton Head: Dr. F. E. Wilder, and Messrs. G. P. Gardner, Renty F. Greaves, and Wm. Read. Alternates: Messrs. Mingo Brown and Phoenix Robertson.

Messrs. J. F. Turner, & Co., who are reported to have super-eded Dr. Warren, as beef contractor for the fleet, commenced supplying on the 21st inst. They have brought down a first class steam launch, the "Falcon," but still it is said there are some doubts yet as to who have the contract.

Tuesday night was bitter cold, ice formed in Beaufort, and it is feared great damage will have been done to the crops of early vegetables that were looking so promising a week ago. Heavy snow storms and intense cold prevailed north. The Northern Pacific Railroad is completely blocked with snow.

Quite a severe storm passed over Beaufort and Port Royal on Sunday night, and vessels off the coast must have experienced a rough time. The steamer from New York that should have arrived at Port Royal on Sunday, on account of stress of weather did not arrive until Tuesday morning.

The Baptist Church, ice cream festival at the Lyceum Hall on Friday evening was a complete success, and realized quite a handsome sum to be used in repainting the church. The hall was most tastefully decorated. The stalls were loaded with fancy articles, which met with a ready sale. The articles remaining on hand were closed out at auction the same evening.

A full board attended the meeting of the pilot commissioners last week. The charges against Pilot Samuels, of gross carelessness and incapacity, in connection with the Russian bark Ruthinas, were investigated. Capt. Weeks appeared, and by the showing he made of the splitting of the sails, whereby the bark was rendered unmanageable, entirely exonerated the pilot from all blame. The schooner Neca was entered and registered as pilot boat, No. 5 with Captains Dunning & Earley as pilots. The board adjourned to meet on the first Monday in April at Port Royal.

At the mass meeting held in Beaufort on Monday evening the following delegates were elected to represent this precinct in the County Convention to be held here on the 31st inst. MEMORANDA. The loss of the Br. ship Dumontelles, that cleared from the Atlantic saw mill, of Messrs. Robinson Boddington & Co., on the 13th of Feb., with 45,327 cu. ft. of lumber, and 148,028 ft. of lumber, is thus announced by telegram: QUEENSTOWN March 16.—The Br. ship "Emmenides," Capt. Beard, from Port Royal, S. C., for Genoa, capsized on the 12th of March. The second mate and seven of the crew arrived safely at this port. The remainder of the crew and the captain, thirteen in all, were drowned.

The Br. bark Northern Star, Worthey, master, is loading at Messrs. Pollitzer's dock, Beaufort with 100 tons coal, for London in England. She will be ready for sea in a few days.

Legislative Notes.

The salary bill, which makes a reduction of \$50,000 on State and County officers, passed the House on Thursday.

The Governor's veto of the bill repealing the charter of the town of Brunswick was sustained by a vote of 46 to 18.

The bill that proposed to estab. criminal proceedings unless commenced before the lapse of twelve months after their commission was killed in the House.

A petition of the citizens of Lancaster was received in the House on Friday asking for an investigation into the action of Judge Mackey for discharging the grand jury for that county, because they returned no bill in a case in which he thought a true bill ought to have been returned, which by the action of conservative members was lost by a vote of 46 to 37.

The conservatives however gave notice that they would move to reconsider the vote on Monday last, but failed to introduce the motion on that day. It is less an discharge grand juries of plea, and in this we have no particular objection to the action taken in Lancaster, because that is the same honored custom of trial by jury altogether. Such unprecedented proceedings are bad on principle and such power in the hands of bad men, would be still worse in practice, tending to lessen the responsibility of jury men, and bring discredit on our entire judicial system.

The committee to investigate the judicial action of Judge Reid have been charged at their own request, they have found nothing that would warrant a report against him.

A concurrent resolution has passed to adjourn to day.

On Tuesday the court of impeachment declared Judge Montgomery Moses guilty on six of the articles of impeachment and Lieut. Gov. Greaves pronounced the sentence of the court, removal from office.

The Governor vetoed the Senate bill a compensating \$30,000 from the phosphate revenue, to pay the members, attendants and employees of the Legislature.

The committee appointed to investigate the charges against Sol. J. Buttz, of the first circuit, reported on Tuesday. He was charged with using his office for the purpose of blackmailing. They recommended his impeachment. Representative Miller, of this county, put in a minority report, disagreeing with the conclusions of the other members of the committee, Messrs. Sloan and Hayne.

OBITUARY.

Miss Katie E. Rollin, the subject of this notice was born in Charleston, S. C., in 1850, and in early childhood gave evidence of the brilliancy for which she was afterwards noted. At the age of twelve years she was taken to Philadelphia by her parents where she received a liberal education, remaining in that city until the close of the war, when she returned to her native city, and entered zealously into the duties of teaching school, and by her efficient service became eminently successful in the large field that was then opened to her labor.

Shortly after re-construction, Miss Rollin entered into the politics of this State, and in a greater extent than any of her sex, and became widely and favorably known in the political and literary world. The wisdom of her counsel and advice, which was given with warmth and fluency, never failed to interest and impress even those who differed with her. She was possessed of a mind of extraordinary power and brilliancy. Gifted with conversational powers that almost dastant rivalry; an eye that enchanted the glance that its beauty attracted. She was the idol of her family and friends. She died at Brunswick, S. C., where she had been sent by direction of her physician in search of health, on the 4th of March, 1876. The last year of her life was fraught with great suffering which she endured with a patient and religious fortitude that gave evidence of her christian character.

This estimable young lady was called by an All-wise Providence in the morning of her life, rich with hope and bright prospects, but such are the decrees of Him who doth all things well. Called from this world of pain and suffering to that celestial shore to become the possessor of the glory of the valley. Therefore let relatives and friends wipe their weeping eyes and inscribe upon her tomb, not made with marble but with sympathizing hearts, the following epitaph:

"Oh, Friend! forever loved, forever dear! What fruitless tears have bathed thy honored bier, What sighs re-echoed to thy parting breath, Whilst thou wast struggling in the pangs of death! If yet thy gentle spirit hover nigh The spot where now the mould'ring ashes lie, How wilt thou heed, recorded on my heart, A grief too deep to trace, the s'pplier's art, No marble marks thy couch of lowly sleep, But living statues th' rays of love's lamp, Brighten th' shades of earth, and on thy tomb, Affliction's scabbard, binds not on thy tomb, A friend's sad sighs, thy faithful doom!"
