STATEBURG, 21st October, 1816. Sir,—The opening the Poll Boxes, for this Congressional District, speaks a language too plain to be misunderstood: By it I perceive that my vote, in favour of the Compensation Bill, has lost me the confidence of my constituents: not wishing to represent people, whose sentiments and feeling upon that point I cannot consistent with my own opinions, advocate; I therefore resign my seat in the fourteenth Congress, to give them an opportunity of electing some one who may lend his exertions to repeal that law; to them so odious, but which opens the door of your national legislature to virtue and talent, altho' poor, and takes from their pockets annually, one cent and not quite a half.
