GENERAL ORDER NO. 5.

I. IN PURSUANCE OF ORDER FROM A. C. Burlington Adjutant and Inspector General of S. C., Captains or officers commanding beat companies are hereby ordered to have enrolled all white male persons between the ages of sixteen and sixty years, in their respective beats—except only persons who have been exempted by the Surgeon General of the State, or the State Board of Surgeons at Columbia, S. C., on the ground of permanent physical disability, and persons detailed by Confederate authority, and make their returns to these headquarters on or before the 14th instant.

2. Those who claim exemption on the ground of physical disability, but who have not certificates from the Surgeon General or the State Board of Surgeons of recent date, will nevertheless be enrolled and be examined by the District Surgeon to be hereafter appointed.

3. Officers commanding Beat Companies will have all vacancies of officers in their respective commands filled by election or by appointment, according to law, and make their returns to these headquarters as above.

4. All officers failing to obey these orders will be dealt with as the law directs. (See General Order No. 22, paragraph 6, Adjutant and Inspector General.)

PERSONS WISHING TO CONTRACT FOR THE PRINTING for the two Houses of the Legislature of South Carolina, or of either of them, will send their proposals to the undersigned, at Columbia, on or before 28th of November inst.

The following, as near as can be ascertained, will be the character and quantity of the work:
 Bills, in Pica, 62 lines, of 35 ems—2,170 ems per page.
 Reports and Documents, Long Primer, 55 lines, of 31 ems each—1,705 ems per page.
 Permanent Journal, Long Primer, 55 lines, of 31 ems each—1,705 ems per page.
 Calendars of the two Houses, Long Primer, 55 lines, of 31 ems each—1,705 ems per page.
 The Bills to be printed on good writing paper, and all other printing to be done on printing paper, of as fine quality as can be procured.
 Extra copies of every paper ordered to be printed in either House, must be furnished to each member of the other branch of the Legislature.
 Of the Bill, Reports, Documents, Journal and Calendar, two hundred copies are required daily, one hundred and fifty for the members of the House of Representatives, and fifty for the members of the Senate.
 The Journal and Calendar must be delivered punctually at or before the hour of meeting of the Houses of each day, and one copy by the same hour, to be delivered at the Executive Department and one copy to the State Auditor.
 The Acts and Permanent Forms of the Houses must be printed, stitched and ready for delivery by the 10th of February, after the regular session. Bills and other work to count double, and pages and side notes to be estimated at the rate of 1,705 ems per page.
 The two Houses will separately choose the Printer of their daily work, and will unite in the selection of the Printer of their permanent work, viz: Acts, Reports, Resolutions, &c.
 Proposals for the Printing of the two Houses, or of either House, must conform to the foregoing specifications.

THE LAWS OF NEWSPAPERS.

- SUBSCRIBERS WHO DO NOT GIVE EXPRESS notice to the contrary, are considered as wishing to continue their subscription.
- If subscribers order the discontinuance of their newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.
- If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the offices to which they are directed, they are held responsible until they have settled their bills and ordered them discontinued.
- If subscribers remove to other places without informing the publishers, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction they are held responsible for the same.
- The Courts have decided that refusing to newspapers from the office or moving and leaving uncalled for is "prima facie" evidence of intent to defraud.
- The Courts have also repeatedly decided that postmaster who neglects to perform his duty of reasonable notice, as required by the Post Office Department of the neglect of a person to take office newspapers addressed to him, renders the publisher liable to the publishers for the price.
