The "Sales Board of Relief" of Ker-law District, require all Manufacturers of Cotton and Woolen Goods, including Yarns, Iron, Nails and other iron ware, Cotton and Wool Cards, Hats, Caps, Paper, Stone ware, Pottery; Leather, Shoes, Boots, Salt, Copperas, Spirituous Liquors, Terebene Oil, and Turpentine, to deliver, to the Board, or any member thereof, or to the Treasurer, on or before the 1st of February next, a statement in writing, under oath, setting forth such and so many of the above articles as were manufactured by them in the year eight hundred and sixty-four; and to deliver to the said Board or their officer in Camden, on or before the said first day of February next, a Tax-in-Kind of three per cent. of all manufactures embraced in their said returns.  
In default of such return or payment, the Board will proceed to estimate the amount of such manufactured products, and assess a Tax-in-Kind thereon of six per cent, and issue execution for three times market value thereof.

THE FOLLOWING ORDER IS PUBLISHED FOR the information of all concerned:  
The immediate and important duties imposed by the General Assembly upon the Soldiers' Boards of Relief are the sole ground upon which the details announced in this order have been allowed by his Excellency the Governor. In view of this special exemption from military service, these duties should engage exclusive attention of those entrusted with them; and they cannot be efficiently discharged without prompt and energetic action on the part of each member of the said Boards. This action is earnestly invoked in view of the serious consequences which, in the present condition of affairs, must ensue from delay or inattention in carrying out the provisions of the Act for the relief of the families of our soldiers for the present year.

### STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, COLUMBIA, Jan. 23, 1865.

GENERAL ORDERS.  
I. THE MEMBERS OF THE VARIOUS "SOLDIERS' BOARDS OF RELIEF" in the State, appointed under an Act of the General Assembly, entitled an "Act to provide for the relief of the families of the soldiers, sailors and marines in the service of this State and the Confederate States," passed December 23d, 1864, and their respective Secretaries and Treasurers who are liable to militia service, are hereby detailed for the special duties to which they have been appointed, and will not be required to report for militia service, either within or without their Districts until further orders.
